## Governor Laura Kelly Celebrates 50 Years of I-70 in Kansas

TOPEKA—Governor Laura Kelly today marked the 50th anniversary of the completion of I-70 in Kansas. The 424-mile stretch of I-70 was the longest continuous segment of Interstate highway to be completed by any state in the United States. At the time, Kansas, Missouri and Pennsylvania were the only states to have a multi-lane I-70 from border to border.

"Kansas's highways exemplify President Eisenhower's vision to improve travel throughout the United States," Governor Laura Kelly said. "I'm proud that my administration is building on that model by developing and passing the new Eisenhower Legacy Transportation Program this year. Preserving and innovating

our state's infrastructure will be critical to our ongoing efforts to bring new business to Kansas."

In March, Governor Kelly signed Kansas' new 10-year transportation program, fittingly named the Eisenhower Legacy Transportation Program (IKE). The program will preserve the state's existing system and provide flexibility to address current and future infrastructure opportunities and challenges.

"Thanks to the support of legislators and Governor Kelly, the IKE program provides the flexibility we need to help achieve our transportation goals," said Kansas Department of Transportation Secretary Julie Lorenz. "At KDOT, we are ready to

do all we can to support a bright future for our state and build on Eisenhower's great legacy."

Kansas' own, President Dwight D. Eisenhower is known as the father of the Interstate system, signing the Federal-Aid Highway Act in June 1956 which created the system and transformed America.

Eisenhower's vision stemmed from his participation in a historic 1919 U.S. Army motor convoy to assess the difficulties of transporting soldiers and military equipment across the United States. On that cross-county expedition, which took 62 days, he realized the potential value of an interconnected, quality road system across the U.S.

Fifty years ago, the busiest stretch of I-70 carried an average of 55,000 vehicles a day. Today, that same stretch carries an average of 85,000 vehicles each day, moving people and goods while playing a vital role in the economic health of Kansas.

### The future USS Kansas City was commissioned, Sat., June 20, 2020

Kansas City is homeported in San Diego with sister ships USS Independence (LCS 2), USS Coronado (LCS 4), USS Jackson (LCS 6), USS Montgomery (LCS 8), USS Gabrielle Giffords (LCS 10), USS Omaha (LCS 12), USS Manchester (LCS 14), USS Tulsa (LCS 16), USS Charleston (LCS 18) and USS Cincinnati (LCS 20).

Kansas City was built in Mobile, Alabama by Austal USA in conjunction with General Dynamics. The ship arrived at Naval Base San Diego, May 24.

Kansas City is the 21st LCS to be delivered to the Navy, and the 11th of the Independence-variant to join the fleet. LCS 22 is the second ship to be named for Kansas City, the largest city in the state of Missouri. The name Kansas City was assigned to a heavy cruiser during World War II; however, construction was canceled after one month due to the end of the war. The name Kansas City was also assigned to the Wichita-class replenishment oiler AOR-3 in 1967. This ship saw service in the Vietnam War and Operation Desert Storm and was decommissioned in 1994.

### AG Derek Schmidt To Google And Apple: Take Responsibility For All 'Contact Tracing' Apps On Your Platforms

TOPEKA—Major technology companies must take responsibility for the rapid proliferation of apps that claim to help contain the spread of COVID-19 through 'contact tracing' but that in fact may put consumers' personal information at risk, Attorney General Derek Schmidt has told Google and Apple.

In a letter sent today to the companies' Chief Executive Officers, Schmidt joined with 36 other state and territory attorneys general asking them to take responsibility for policing the growing number of 'contact tracing' and related notification apps available for download through their platforms.

"[These unregulated apps pose] a risk to consumers' personally identifiable information, including sensitive health information, that could continue long after the present public health emergency ends," the attorneys general wrote. "[S]everal COVID-19 related contact tracing apps are already available on Google Play and the App Store. Some of those apps may endanger consumers' personal information. We are particularly concerned about purportedly 'free' apps that utilize GPS tracking, contain advertisements and/or in-app purchases, and are not affiliated with any public health authority or legitimate research institution."

The attorneys general specifically ask Google and Apple to:

- Verify that every app labeled or marketed as related to contact tracing, COVID-19 contact tracing, or coronavirus contact tracing or exposure notification is affiliated with a municipal, county, state or federal public health authority, or a hospital or university in the U.S. that is working with such

# Tom's Tasty Treats

This week, there is a savory treat to try. It would be good with some fried chicken, or a beef roast. Easy, and ready in no time, if you are a bleu cheese lover, then this is for you! Adjust the recipe quantities to suit your family's taste and make a batch soon.

## Baby New Potatoes With Bleu Cheese Crumbles

### Ingredients:

2-3 lbs. Red-skinned New Potatoes  
3/4 c Milk  
3/4 stick Butter  
1/2 t Salt  
6oz. Bleu Cheese crumbles  
Black Pepper, to taste  
1sm. Carton Sour Cream

### Directions:

If the potatoes are large, cut them in half, and cook with their skins on. Steam the potatoes for 14-15 minutes, or until tender. As they steam, heat the milk and butter until the butter melts. Stir in the salt. Drain the potatoes and return them to the pot.

Add milk mixture, in small amounts and start to mash the potatoes. Leave them with a coarse texture. Add just enough milk to reach the desired consistency. Add half of the Bleu Cheese crumbles and the black pepper. Taste, and add salt, if needed.

public health authorities;

- Remove any app that cannot be verified as affiliated with one of the entities identified above; and
  - Pledge to remove all COVID-19-related exposure notification and contact tracing apps, including those that utilize the new exposure notification application program interfaces (APIs) developed by Google and Apple, from Google Play and the App Store once the COVID-19 national emergency ends. In addition, the attorneys general asked Google and Apple to provide written confirmation to their offices once the apps have been removed or an explanation why removal of a particular app or apps would impair the public health authorities affiliated with each app.
- With enactment earlier

this month of the COVID-19 Contact Tracing Privacy Act, legislation recommended by Schmidt, Kansas became a leader among the states in protecting citizens' privacy and civil liberties by tightly regulating contact tracing during the current pandemic. One new provision of Kansas law prohibits state and local governments from using contact tracing apps and similar means of electronic tracking citizens' movements and associations. Thus, no contact tracing app currently available for download to cellphones is lawfully affiliated with any government health authority in Kansas.

"Implementing these limited measures could help protect the personally identifiable information and sensitive health data of millions of consumers during this crisis," the attorneys general wrote to the companies.

## AG Derek Schmidt: Kansas to protect privacy and civil liberties during COVID-19 'contact tracing' by statute

TOPEKA — When the new COVID-19 response legislation is signed into law, Kansas will become a leader among the states in protecting citizens' privacy and civil liberties during the pandemic by tightly regulating "contact tracing," Attorney General Derek Schmidt said today.

The COVID-19 response bill approved this week by the Legislature contains a section enacting the COVID-19 Contact Tracing Privacy Act. The provision was recommended by the attorney general.

"Contact tracing is a long-established method used by the public health community to identify and contain contagious and infectious diseases," Schmidt said. "But the sheer scope and unregulated nature of contact tracing during the COVID-19 pandemic have left many Kansans concerned about the procedure and about how collected information may be used. With this new statute, Kansas will put in place enforceable statutory protections specifically to protect citizens' privacy and civil liberties during COVID-19 contact tracing."

Contact tracing is the process of identifying people with whom an infected person has had recent contact that has potential to spread the disease. Typically, people who have been in contact with an infected person are then notified and advised they should be tested and consider self-quarantining if appropriate. Local governments and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) have been using contact tracing to help contain the spread of COVID-19, but until now no state law has specifically governed the practice.

One proposal from the Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security recommended 100,000 contact tracers may be needed nationwide. So far, more than 11,000 people are working as contact tracers in response to COVID-19 nationwide, according to news reports. In Kansas, KDHE announced plans to recruit 400 contact tracers, in addition to contact tracers deployed by local governments.

But until now, no statute has specifically regulated the practice of contact tracing, and legal disputes already had

arisen. In April, concerns were raised after news reports suggested KDHE might be using cellphone location data to track COVID-19, and in May residents sued Linn County over its contact tracing practices.

"This new legislation does not address every question," said Schmidt, noting that the new law is temporary only through April 2021 to give the Legislature time for a more thorough, global review of how contact tracing should be regulated. "But at least this puts in place basic protections for civil liberties and privacy to replace the unregulated wild west that otherwise was unfolding in COVID-19 contact tracing."

The new legislation, which applies to both the state and to local government authorities, contains the following provisions to protect citizens' civil liberties and the privacy of information collected through contact tracing:

- Participation in contact tracing must be voluntary. No person may be required to participate, nor forbidden from participating.

- Contact tracing may not collect information through cellphone tracking and may not use any information collected through cellphone tracking.

- Information collected through contact tracing must be used only for contact trac-

ing, kept confidential and not disclosed. The information must be safely and securely destroyed when no longer needed for contact tracing.

- Only specified information may be collected by contact tracers. The list of information that may be collected must be established by the Secretary of Health and Environment through the open and transparent process of adopting formal rules and regulations.

- The government may not require any third party to collect contact data. Information voluntarily collected by third parties may only be obtained by the government with the consent of both the third party and the person the information relates to, or with a judicially supervised warrant.

- People working as contact tracers must receive training and must affirm that they are familiar with the privacy and civil liberties protections in the legislation.

Violations of the Contact Tracing Privacy Act may result in civil or criminal penalties.

"I commend the legislature for supporting this measure swiftly and in a bipartisan fashion," Schmidt said. "In the coming months, Kansas needs a more thorough, in-depth review of how contact tracing should be regulated, and our office stands ready to assist with that review."

## Political Signs Not Allowed On Highway Right Of Way

It's a sign of the season — campaigning to support your favorite political candidate. However, if your plans involve placing a political sign, the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) reminds you to make sure it's not located on highway right of way.

By law, all right of way on state highways is to be used exclusively for public highway purposes. Only regulatory, guide signs and warning signs are allowed on the state highway system. KDOT has jurisdiction over all interstate, Kansas and U.S. routes on the state's 9,500-mile system.

The public should be aware that all political campaign signs or billboards are prohibited on the state right of way.

When KDOT maintenance crews find political or business advertising on state right of way, the signs will be removed immediately without notice. All such signs will then be taken to the closest KDOT subarea office where they can be picked up by the owner with the agreement they will not be placed on state right of way again. All political campaign signs not picked up will be disposed of after the election.

Political campaign advertising is allowed on private property bordering state right of way. However, people erecting signs on private property must first obtain permission from the property owner.

## Landmark Supreme Court Ruling: Its Now Federal Law, LGBTQ Employees are Protected in the Work Place from Discrimination

In a 6-3 decision, the Supreme Court ruled in favor of Gay and Transgender rights. It's now the 5th anniversary of Gays being allowed to marry, and now, we have this universal protection upheld and decided in June--Gay Pride month! This Supreme Court ruling bans discrimination against the LGBTQ community. "For 50 years, the right not to be fired, has been at the center of the Gay Rights movement. This right has been completely illusive, until now."\* said Richard Socarides, staff writer for The New Yorker, and Senior adviser to President Clinton. \*(29 States still had laws which allowed

employers to fire workers on the basis of their being Gay or transgender, and including Missouri.)

Trump appointee, Justice Neil Gorsuch, wrote the Majority opinion, and conservative Chief Justice John Roberts voted in support of the ban on discrimination. Justice Gorsuch wrote: "Congress adopted broad language for an employer to rely on an employee's sex when deciding to fire that employee." "We do not hesitate to recognize today a necessary consequence of that legislative choice: An employer who fires an individual merely for their being Gay or transgender, defies the law." New York Congressman, Sean Patrick Maloney

said, "Activism works! Engagement works, but days like this, make it worth it! So finally, in 2020 America, this protection for the more than, 7.1 million Gay identified people, is at last, the law of the land. This is a huge victory, and so past due!

The Civil Rights act was passed by Congress in 1964, and specifically, it was Title 7 which the Court examined in this case. The case was brought to the Supreme Court by a transgendered person, Amy Stevens. She was fired from her position at a funeral home, after he told the owner that he would be making the transition to female. Ms. Stevens passed last month, but her case has

opened a new chapter in American life and culture. Socarides said, "The rights of Gay people are becoming more accepted and are going mainstream."

Human Rights Campaign, HRC, President said that there was still much to accomplish in the "fight for equality."

Much needs to be done in Education, Public Accommodation, and Credit."

He spoke of the epidemic of violence on black, transgendered woman that must be addressed. He called for a halt to the practice of conversion therapy, which has been shown to be non- effective, in changing Gay homosexual men into heterosexual men.

Pete Buttigieg, the first openly Gay man to run for president, said, "It's an enormous step forward. It reminds us of the possibility for progress in this country." This is the work and the accomplishment of hundreds, if not thousands of Gay activists and Gay supporters. We've marched at the White House in many past and current administrations.
