AG Derek Schmidt provides updated guidance to law enforcement and prosecutors on enforcement of emergency orders

Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt today provided updated guidance to law enforcement agencies and county prosecutors statewide on the enforcement of emergency orders, following the passage of House Bill 2016 last month and the issuance of Executive Order 20-52 earlier today.

The guidance, in the form of a memorandum, updates previous guidance provided by the attorney general on

March 24, April 8 and May 28. The memo reflects changes to the Kansas Emergency Management Act adopted by the Kansas Legislature on June 4, and signed into law by the governor on June 8. Those amendments included changing the violation of an emergency order issued by the governor from a Class A misdemeanor to a civil violation, which may be enforced by a lawsuit filed by the county

or district attorney. As such, law enforcement officers may no longer arrest or detain individuals for violations of an emergency order.

Additionally, Schmidt noted in the memo that under House Bill 2016, individual counties may elect to adopt provisions that are "less stringent" than a governor's order. If an individual county has done so, then

Governor Kelly Announces Federal Approval of Crisis Counseling Funding under Kansas's Major Disaster Declaration

Funding for Mental Health Program Benefiting Individuals Impacted by COVID-19

TOPEKA — Governor Laura Kelly has announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has approved a Kansas plan for crisis counseling under the individual assistance category of the Stafford Act.

Funding is provided by FEMA's Crisis Counseling Program Immediate Services Program (ISP). ISP is a program supported by a grant that provides disaster relief assistance offered through specially trained providers and other supports for up to 60 days after a major disaster declaration. Funding was secured through partnership with Kansas Division of Emergency Management, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services and Kansas Department of Agriculture.

"Kansans have faced challenges and uncertainty since the beginning of this unprecedented health crisis," Kelly said. "We are developing a program with both virtual and person-to-person support offered with social distancing and preventing the spread of COVID-19 in mind. It is imperative to provide options for support during this time to let people know they are not alone, and help is available for those who need it."

The first round of training was held on June 19 and 22 for providers to help support mental health initiatives designed to benefit Kansans affected by the pandemic. The initial Core Content Training is a two-day training developed by The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) that covers basic crisis counseling skills and services, data collection and stress management techniques. Over 40 individuals were trained during this session. This opportunity positions Kansas to address the complexities of COVID-19. Collaborating agencies are establishing an approach to provide outreach and services by telephone, virtually and through social media. The program will focus on providing crisis counseling and disaster recovery options, promoting the use or development of healthy coping strategies, connecting survivors with appropriate people and agencies that can assist them, and completing referrals to other disaster recovery programs or mental health providers.

Hotlines through this program with trained crisis counseling staff and online support and resources are available now.

The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, 1-800-273-TALK (8255), provides free 24/7, confidential support for people in distress, prevention and crisis resources for you or your loved ones, and best practices for professionals. SAMHSA offers the Disaster Distress Helpline, 1-800-985-5990. The Helpline is a 24-hour-a-day, seven-day-a-week and free resource that responds to people who need crisis counseling and support in dealing with the traumatic effects of a natural or human-caused disaster.

With Kansas: Stronger Together as a program motto and brand, this program will also provide toolkits with educational materials and general outreach information for citizens, businesses and providers. Materials are available for the public and encouraged to be used as needed and shared in locations such as grocery stores, churches, businesses, funeral homes, social media, medical clinics or other places where individuals may gather. Some topics addressed include grief and loss, financial stress, coping mechanisms, children and coping, anxiety related to COVID-19, possible suicidal ideation,

general resource information, agriculture hardship and other topics. Information can be found online via Facebook at Kansas: Stronger Together.

"As we continue to find ways to proactively battle the ongoing mental health and social effects of this pandemic, I think it's important we recognize the impact puts us in uncharted territory in that it reaches every corner of our state," KDADS Secretary Laura Howard said. "This funding allows us to implement a program that can also reach every corner of our state and is designed to link those in need to crisis counseling and community supports as well as other resources, strategies and comforts as we face this together."

Kansas will be requesting ongoing crisis counseling assistance from FEMA with a request to extend crisis counseling services to Kansans through the Crisis Counseling Program Regular Services Program. The Regular Services Program (RSP) is a CCP grant program that provides disaster relief assistance for ongoing counseling services and support for up to nine months after a major disaster declaration. A website is currently being developed.

the governor's emergency order may not be enforced in that county, even by a civil lawsuit.

The new law also authorizes the attorney general to bring enforcement actions.

"The attorney general's office will defer to the decisions of local county and district attorneys and has no plans to bring our own enforcement actions simply for not wearing a mask," Schmidt said. "I think the better approach is to leave any enforcement to local authorities who know their communities best and to give Kansans information and encouragement and trust them to make wise decisions. So here's what I encourage: Be safe on this Independence Day weekend, use common sense and caution to keep yourself and others healthy, heed the advice of the CDC and other public health experts, and wear a mask for now whenever you're in a public setting and cannot maintain a safe distance from other people."

Restrictions to Continue Because of Coronavirus Pandemic

Wyandotte County will continue indefinitely under the restrictions of Phase Three of the Ad Astra plan to reopen Kansas.

That was the message that Mayor David Alvey conveyed to members of the Congressional Forum Friday, June 18 during a special teleconference via Zoom.

The Forum usually meets the third Friday of each month. However, Mayor Alvey, along with several other Unified Government employees, have been furloughed because of budget restraints.

Mayor Alvey will not work Mondays and Fridays for the

next five weeks. Lack of sales tax revenue, particularly from the Village West areas, has caused the Unified Government to be about \$23 million short for its 2020 budget. Estimates are it will mean an \$18 million shortage for 2021.

Gov. Laura Kelly submitted the Ad Astra Plan May 26 to deal with the coronavirus pandemic. Under Phase three of the plan, Mayor Alvey urged residents to wear masks, maintain a six-foot distance during indoor and outdoor activities, avoid socializing with groups of more than 45 persons and to wash their hands regularly.

Mayor Alvey said the Unified Government will be guided by medical personnel whose actions are data-driven. He said there has been a recent increase in the number of COVID patients in Wyandotte County.

Mayor Alvey said a class of 24 police cadets will not be hired as officers because of the

Budget shortfall. He said that is unfortunate as the Police Department conducted an extensive recruit effort to attract these police recruits who live here.

Mayor Alvey praised the many groups that he met

with, via teleconference, including area clergy, business leaders and public officials.

Mayor Alvey said despite the pandemic, various economic development projects are moving ahead including the Turner Logistics and the American Royal developments.

The Congressional Forum is a committee of the Kansas City, Kansas, Area Chamber of Commerce. About 50 persons were registered for the teleconference.

Unified Government orders wearing masks in public

The Unified Government of Wyandotte County has ordered the wearing of masks

in public, starting at 5 p.m. Tuesday, June 30. Wyandotte County is in Phase 3 of the statewide Ad Astra reopening plan until Monday, July 6. However, the Unified Government has not said when it will lift the mask-wearing order. Dr. Allen Greiner, the chief medical officer for the Unified Government, said the seven-day rolling average of positive cases continues to be on the upswing. As of Saturday, June 27 Wyandotte County had 2,093 confirmed cases and 80 deaths attributed to the coronavirus. For more information, see the website wycokc.org/COVID-19.

Unified Government proposes no increase in property tax rate

Doug Bach, the County Administrator, has recommended no increase in either the city or county mill rates for 2021. Property valuations are up nearly 6 percent. Sales tax revenue, particularly from the Village West Area, has taken a very serious hit because of the coronavirus. The budget is \$11 million less than the original 2020 budget. The total 2021 budget is slightly more than \$380 million. A public hearing on the 2021 budget will be at 5 p.m. Monday, July 13 at City Hall. The budget must be approved by the Unified Commission.

Woodlands property for sale

The Woodlands horse and dog track, owned by Las Vegas casino owner Phil Ruffin, is for sale. Ruffin bought the

property about five years ago with plans to restore the horse track. Now, Scannell Properties, based in Indianapolis, Ind., has announced interest in purchasing the property and developing five warehouses and retail spaces at the corner of 99th Street and Leavenworth Road. Scannell has more than 300 properties in 44 states and Canada.

Water quality report released

The Kansas City Board of Public Utilities recently released its annual water quality report. The report was generated from results based on the utility's certified laboratory. The laboratory ran 41,800 tests on 8,700 water samples that assured the water met quality standards. The BPU water system pumps 30 million gallons a day. Speedway announces race dates

The Kansas Speedway will hold races Thursday through Saturday, July 23 through July 25. Earlier races scheduled for last May were cancelled because of the coronavirus. The racing will kick off Thursday with the NASCAR 400 contest. An ARCA race will be Friday. The Xfinity Series will be Saturday; Truck races are planned for Friday and Saturday. Earlier this month, Speedway officials said the races will be held without fans; however, that could change.

I-70 marks 50 years of service to motorists

Gov. Laura Kelly recently marked the 50th anniversary of the completion of I-70. She said President Dwight Eisenhower's vision to improve travel throughout the United States was significant. She cited the importance of infrastructure to bring new business to Kansas. President Eisenhower learned first-hand in 1919 when a U.S. Army convoy took 62 days to cross the United States. When Gen. Eisenhower was in Europe during World War II; he marveled at the high-speed autobahn system in Germany. Today, I-70 carries an average of 85,000 vehicles in Kansas a day, including a substantial portion in Wyandotte County.

Dr. Anthony Fauci, On Preventing Coronavirus!!!

"I think what we're missing, is that, this is not just an isolated risk to only you. Because if you get infected, you are part--- innocently or inadvertently of Propagating the Dynamic process of the pandemic." "Because, chances are that you are going to infect someone else." ... "The overwhelming number of people that are getting infected are young people that you've seen in news clips or in papers. These images show these young people out in crowds, at bars and restaurants---everyone enjoying themselves. But the thing that everyone needs to realize is that when you go out, not wearing a mask, you then become part of the transmission process. So, if you become infected, you will infect someone else!" "We know this happens because the reproduction element of the virus is not less than one." "So, ultimately, you may infect someone who is vulnerable. It may be someone's Grandmother, Grandfather, Aunt or Uncle. It may be a person you know with asthma, heart disease, diabetes or it may be a person with cancer who is having chemotherapy or radiation. It may be a child with leukemia." "So, you have an individual responsibility to yourself, but in addition, you have a Societal responsibility. Because if we want to end this Coronavirus outbreak, everyone must realize that we All are part of the process. Remember all of the CDC Guidelines that were put out to safely reopen the country---we can either be part of the solution or part of the problem!" "I just wish to make a plea to everyone, if we don't extinguish this outbreak, sooner or later, even those areas of the country that are now doing well, will become vulnerable to the spread of the Coronavirus." "So, We All need to take that into account, because we are all in this together. And the only way we are going to end the Covid-19 Pandemic is by ending it Together!" "Thank you."
