Governor Laura Kelly Announces URBN Partnership to Create Up to 2,000 Jobs and Approximately \$350 Million Kansas Investment *Urban Outfitters Inc. to build 880,000-square-foot distribution center*

TOPEKA – Governor Laura Kelly announced that Urban Outfitters’ Inc. (URBN) new 880,000-square-foot omni-channel distribution center will be located on ancillary land at Kansas Speedway in Wyandotte County. The partnership between the State of Kansas and Philadelphia-based URBN will create up to 2,000 new jobs and invest approximately \$350 million in Kansas over several years.

“I’m excited to announce our new partnership with URBN and to welcome them to Kansas,” Governor Laura Kelly said. “This is a transformational project for our state, bringing a new, high-profile corporate partner and as many as 2,000 good-paying jobs. This was a true collaboration to generate an economic development success story that will deliver benefits in Wyandotte County and beyond in our state.”

URBN cited Kansas’ central location, transportation infrastructure and skilled workforce as key factors in choosing Kansas for its distribution operation, acknowledging the location as critical to its distribution network.

The Governor praised the efforts of the Kansas Department of Commerce in securing this move and reiterated the importance of focusing on economic development efforts during Kansas’ growth and recovery in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic.

“Rebuilding our economic development efforts has been one of my administration’s top priorities, and it’s good that we did,” Governor Kelly said. “Our path to economic recovery will be through the investments we make to our economic development, infrastructure, education, and health care. Our new foundation will encourage more companies like URBN to bring their business to Kansas.”

Commerce Secretary David Toland said URBN is an ideal fit for Kansas.

“This project not only reflects the type of company our state is poised to recruit, it’s also a testament to how we want to work,” Secretary David Toland said. “Like the creative folks at URBN, our team was constantly thinking outside the box, considering many angles, remaining flexible, collaborating and putting

great minds together to make this work.”

“URBN is incredibly excited for the opportunity to become a part of the Kansas community,” URBN Chief Development Officer Dave Ziel said. “Our priorities in identifying the home for our new omni-channel distribution center focused on people, and it was the quality of the local workforce and the commitment of their representatives in the state that convinced us this is the right place to be. This facility will enable us to support continued digital growth at all our brands, and it will allow us to reach our digital customers faster and more efficiently than ever before. As the center of our distribution network this facility makes Kansas a home for us for the long-term, and we look forward to building relationships across the state as we grow together.”


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Oligarchy or Democracy?

The November 3 General Election is when we get to make America’s history by choosing what kind of country we want to be a part of. In an interview with journalist Bill Moyers (at BillMoyers.com), Boston College historian Heather Cox Richardson suggests that what’s at stake is the proper use of government and that we have two broad choices: (1) is our government to “protect property, so that people can accumulate more and more of it and thereby get the power and the education and the connections to ... direct society in a way that’s [theoretically] good for all of us” or (2) is government to “protect equality before the law” and to guarantee that “all people are created equal and have equal access to resources and to opportunity.”



That’s a stark difference between a government run by the rich and powerful making policies that might—or might not—be “good for all of us” or a government, as Lincoln put it, “of the people, by the people, and for the people” making policies to benefit everyone as equitably as possible. Unless we’re among the small number of the rich and powerful, that should be an easy choice come election time. It’s a choice between oligarchy and democracy.

Richardson traces the fortunes of men with fortunes from pre-Civil War Southern plantation owners who directed a society ruled by—and for—white men to the post-war extension of white male supremacy to the West by cattle barons, farmers, and mine owners with little concern for Native Americans, Mexican Americans, or for the many Blacks who saw opportunity in the West but were literally white-washed out of ruling-class Western mythology. Nearly one-third of cowboys were Black, but we didn’t see them in Western movies, a fact brilliantly satirized in Mel Brooks’s 1974 comedy classic *Blazing Saddles* where the arrival of a mild-mannered Black sheriff panics the all-white residents of a frontier town. Blacks and Hispanics are also absent from the West in most schoolbooks.

Rule by the rich was the rule during the late 19th century Gilded Age when six Western states were hurriedly admitted to the Union in 12 months to preserve the Electoral College majority of white supremacist men of property. The old Confederate ideology had conquered the West and stacked the deck in Presidential elections. It still does.

The pendulum swung toward democracy with FDR’s popular New Deal that helped ordinary people weather the Great Depression, but the urge for oligarchy returned with Reagan’s distrust of government. He and other conservatives opposed unions as threats to the wealthy’s economic power; opposed safety, environmental, and other regulations as costly restrictions on their freedom to profit; and opposed taxes as taking their money to spend on those who didn’t earn it and didn’t deserve it.

Deregulation, low taxes, and the “privatization” of public services like schools, transportation, and the post office became goals for conservatives who see protection of their wealth and influence as government’s chief purpose. Public services belong to all of us, so, except for the military, the propertied class isn’t interested.

The alternate view is that government belongs to all of us equally and that the welfare of the community takes precedence over private advantage. The whole point of democratic government is to be a people’s union to promote the common good. Bill Moyers said the rich can “buy more yachts than the rest of us, but we can’t allow them to buy more democracy.” They’ve been buying more for decades. We can stop it in November.




Fidel (Wowie) Saucedo, 83, of Kansas City, KS passed away July 20, 2020.

He graduated from Argentine High School. After graduation he joined the Air Force. He received an honorable discharge four years later. After leaving the Air Force, he worked at Fort Leavenworth, as a technician, till he retired.

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AAA Finds Active Driving Assistance Systems

Do Less to Assist Drivers and More to Interfere

New automotive engineering research finds 73% of performance issues were related to lane centering

AAA automotive researchers found that over the course of 4,000 miles of real-world driving, vehicles equipped with active driving assistance systems experienced some type of issue every 8 miles, on average. Researchers noted instances of trouble with the systems keeping the vehicles tested in their lane and coming too close to other vehicles or guardrails. AAA also found that active

driving assistance systems, those that combine vehicle acceleration with braking and steering, often disengage with little notice—almost instantly handing control back to the driver. A dangerous scenario if a driver has become disengaged from the driving task or has become too dependent on the system. AAA recommends manufacturers increase the scope of testing for active driving assistance systems

and limit their rollout until functionality is improved to provide a more consistent and safer driver experience.

Active driving assistance, classified as Level 2 driving automation on a scale of six (0-5) created by the SAE International, are advanced driver assistance systems (ADAS) that provide the highest level of automated vehicle technology available to the public today. This means for a majority of drivers, their first or only interaction with vehicle automation is through these types of systems, which according to AAA, are far from 100% reliable.

“AAA has repeatedly found that active driving assistance systems do not perform consistently, especially in real-world scenarios,” said Greg Brannon, director of automotive engineering and industry relations. “Manufacturers need to work toward more dependable technology, including improving lane keeping assistance and providing more adequate alerts.”

AAA tested the functionality of active driving assistance systems in real-world conditions and in a closed-course setting to determine how well they responded to common driving scenarios. On public roadways, nearly three-quarters (73%) of errors involved instances of lane departure or erratic lane position. While AAA’s closed-course testing found that the systems performed mostly as expected, they were particularly challenged when approaching a simulated disabled vehicle.

When encountering this test scenario, in aggregate, a collision occurred 66% of the time and the average impact speed was 25 mph.

“Active driving assistance systems are designed to assist the driver and help make the roads safer, but the fact is, these systems are in the early stages of their development,” added Brannon. “With the number of issues we experienced in testing, it is unclear how these systems enhance the driving experience in their current form. In the long run, a bad experience with current technology may set back public acceptance of more fully automated vehicles in the future.”

AAA’s 2020 automated vehicle survey found that only one in ten drivers (12%) would trust riding in a self-driving car. To increase consumer confidence in future automated vehicles, it is important that car manufacturers perfect functionality as much as possible—like active driving assistance systems available now—before deployment in a larger fleet of vehicles. AAA has met with industry leaders to provide insight from the testing experience and recommendations for improvement. The insights are also shared with AAA members and the public to inform their driving experiences and vehicle purchase decisions.

Methodology

AAA conducted closed-course testing and naturalistic driving in partnership with the Automobile Club of

Southern California’s Automotive Research Center and AAA Northern California, Nevada and Utah’s GoMomentum Proving Grounds. Using a defined set of criteria, AAA selected the following vehicles for testing: 2019 BMW X7 with “Active Driving Assistant Professional”, 2019 Cadillac CT6 with “Super Cruise™”, 2019 Ford Edge with “Ford Co-Pilot360™”, 2020 Kia Telluride with “Highway Driving Assist” and 2020 Subaru Outback with “EyeSight®” and were sourced from the manufacturer or directly from dealer inventory. The 2019 Cadillac CT6 and the 2019 Ford Edge were evaluated only within naturalistic environments. Tom's Tasty Treats

Summertime is always a great time to enjoy the company of friends and family, and this week's tasty treat will be a hit, at your next gathering.

For best results, plan to make these delicious bar or appetizers, three or four days in advance. They are the Best!

Tom's Mediterranean Style Olives

Ingredients:

- 1- 7 oz. can Ripe Olives, drained and Rinsed**
- 1- 7 oz. Jumbo Green Pitted Olives
- 1 jar Stuffed Green Olives with pimentos
- 1 Carrot, cut into 1/2" pieces, thinly slices
- 1 small Red Onion, sliced into thin rings*
- 1 c Cauliflower florets, cut in half or thirds
- 2 t Fresh Thyme leaves, coarsely chopped
- 2 sprigs Rosemary, with the needles removed
- 4-5 cloves Garlic, each cut into 1/8" thin slices
- 1/2 Lemon, rind finely grated, then juiced.
- 1/2 c Red Wine Vinegar
- Extra Virgin Olive Oil

Optional additions:

- 1 jar Pearl onions

*Use either the Red onion, or the Pearl onions, not both.

**Very important step, if not well rinsed, these will tint the oil.

- 1/2--1 t Red Pepper flakes*

Directions:

Layer the olives, carrot slices, cauliflower pieces, Rosemary, sliced garlic, grated lemon rind in a wide mouthed Mason jar. Repeat until just at the lip of the jar, then pour the red wine vinegar and then the Olive oil, to cover.

* Use this sparingly as the longer the jar sets, the more heat the pepper flakes will impart.

Chill for three days and shake occasionally.

Bring to room temperature when serving, but good cold as well!

Great to serve with cheese and crackers, with Cocktails, Salami or Summer sausage, and they are always a tasty hors d'oeuvre or snack! Divide into smaller jars to give at the Holidays. These will keep for three months so begin in mid-November for giving at Christmas.

Presentation always counts, so top with a piece of cotton fabric and tie a bow with Raffia or twine. So easy, so quick to make, and so scrumptious! A tasty treat indeed! Enjoy!

Biggest Quarterly GDP Drop in U.S. History!

Q2, Gross Domestic Product (GDP) from April to June dropped a staggering 32.9%. This represents the biggest drop in economic activity that the U.S. economy has ever experienced. The drop had been earlier forecasted at 34.7%. So, Q2 is slightly better than what had been anticipated. To compare, Q1 fell 5% making Q2 plunge 27.9% larger. Scott Bauer, CEO Prosper Trading said, "prices for domestic purchases, which are a key inflation indicator, fell 1.5% in the second quarter, contrasted with the 1.4 increase in domestic prices in the first quarter."

Though the cause of the record drop in GDP is due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, the National Bureau of Economic Research states that the current recession, began in February 2020, a month prior to the Pandemic declaration. Mr. Bauer, said "The U.S. Economy has never been through this sharp of a drop over such a short period of time--Not even during the Great Depression, or the Great Recession." "To compare, the worst quarter during the 2008 Financial Crisis, occurred in the last quarter when Q4 GDP was a negative, -8.4%. and the previous low mark for the US GDP was a 10% drop which occurred in Q1, 1958. Every day is something new for the U.S. economy. There is nothing "normal" going on, and conditions have created the greatest wealth gap, not seen since the 1930's. Corporations prosper, as well as those persons invested in them or in the stock market.

Economist, Ray Dalio sums up the current state of the U.S. economy and describes it as a non-market economy, as a political economy, and as it being a "new paradigm." Along with having to deal daily with the Covid-19 virus, now there are new economic rules to understand in order to live and thrive in the United States, in the 21st Century.
