Governor Laura Kelly Announces \$2 Billion in New Capital Investment in 2020

TOPEKA – Governor Laura Kelly today announced that the State of Kansas has officially surpassed \$2 billion in new capital investment in 2020. This investment is brought by new economic development projects driven by Governor Kelly’s administration and the Kansas Department of Commerce.

“The arrival of COVID-19 threatened to undermine the significant progress my administration has made to rebuild Kansas’ economic development recruitment efforts,” Governor Kelly said. “But with the assistance of Secretary David Toland and the dedicated team at the Department of Commerce, we have continued to bring in new projects or grow existing businesses. This significant milestone in investment illustrates our strong momentum, which will allow us to continue creating jobs and strengthening our state’s economic foundation.”

As of Tuesday, Governor Kelly’s administration has closed 86 projects in 2020, worth nearly \$2.15 billion in capital investment and creating more than 8,100 jobs. Since Governor Kelly has been in office, her administration has closed 179 projects worth more than \$3.47 billion in

capital investment and which promise to create nearly 19,000 jobs.

“This achievement would have been impossible without the hard work and dedication of our team at the Department of Commerce,” Secretary Toland said. “We have the best economic development team in the country thanks to Governor Kelly’s commitment to rebuilding this agency and her belief in smart, transparent economic development. Expect much more from Commerce – we’re not slowing down.”

To celebrate the investment numbers, Governor Kelly and Secretary Toland today visited and toured Plastikon Healthcare in Lawrence.

The company, a plastic and contract manufacturer, recently expanded its facility to produce test tubes for COVID-19 testing. The expansion will bring nearly \$6 million in capital investment to Kansas and create about 40 jobs.

“Plastikon is an innovative, forward-thinking company with a strong record of responding quickly and efficiently to pressing health care needs,” Governor Kelly said. “Its ability to incorporate new technologies will aid the state in the production of much-needed testing supplies to mitigate the spread

of COVID-19 and keep our businesses and schools open. I thank them for their dedication to our state.”

Capital Investment Highlights:

The Plastikon expansion joins the ranks of approximately 86 new economic development projects completed across the state this year, including:

- Urban Outfitters, Inc., whose new 880,000-square-foot omnichannel distribution center in Wyandotte County will create up to 2,000 new jobs and invest over \$400 million in Kansas over the next several years;
- Amazon’s two new fulfillment centers in Kansas City, Kansas, and Park City, which will create more than 1,000 full-time jobs;
- Great Plains Manufacturing’s new manufacturing facility in Salina, which will result in more than \$43 million in capital investment and create 130 full-time jobs;
- The new Nor-Am Cold Storage facility in Dodge City, which will bring 90 new full-time jobs and \$30 million in capital investment;



Business West learns of development at Annual Meeting

Despite the coronavirus pandemic, Wyandotte County continues to attract new and expanded development. That was the message that Katherine Carttar and Greg Kindle brought to the Annual Meeting of Business West via ZOOM Wednesday, Oct. 21.

Carttar is Director of Economic Development for the Unified Government and Kindle is President of the Wyandotte Economic Development Council. They said that so far this year Wyandotte County has attracted \$849 million in development. They told of the following projects:

- Old Dominion Freight Line. This truck terminal will be at K-7 and Speaker Road in Bonner Springs and will have 300 employees with more than 154,000 square feet of floor space. It will be a \$45-million project and include cross-dock and office space. There will also be space on the 11 acres for related retail and commercial development.

- Urban Outfitters. This will be on the southeast corner of 118th Street and State Avenue on Kansas Speedway property that NASCAR will sell. The company will have 880,000 square feet of floor space and employ 2,000 persons. Childcare and internships will be available. This will be a \$403 million project.

- Homefield. This will be at the Schlitterbahn site and offer a youth softball and baseball complex and a synthetic turf training field. Retail and a hotel are planned. The estimated cost would be \$330 million.

- Woodlands Redevelopment. This former horse and dog track will become a development of Scannell Properties. The initial project is estimated to cost \$110 million and employ 1,000 persons. It will be a warehouse and fulfillment center. Amazon is committed as the first tenant.

- Turner Logistics Center. This company expects to have two of five buildings operational by the end of the year; the cost of the project will be \$32 million. It will have more than 590,000 square feet of floor space. Space will be used for warehouse and fulfillment purposes. Construction on the divergent diamond interchange on the Turner Diagonal is

Tom's Tasty Treats

This week's tasty treat is one that I tasted for the first time at a good friend's house, and was so impressed, that I asked her for the recipe, that same night! I know these bars will soon become a traditional treat for many of you:

Pecan Pie Bars

Ingredients:

Crust:

1 3/4 c Flour
3/4 c cold Butter, cubed
1/4 t Salt
1/4 c Sugar
1/3 c Pecans, finely chopped

Filling:

2/3 c Brown Sugar
1/3 c Flour
1 t Salt
1 1/2 c Corn Syrup*
4 Lg. Eggs
2 t Vanilla
1 1/2 c Pecans, chopped
*Light or dark will work.

Directions:

Set oven to 350°.

Combine the flour, butter, salt, and sugar. Beat until the mixture has the texture of small crumbs. Add the finely chopped pecans, and mix well.

Press into an ungreased 9x13" pan.

Bake at 350° for 20 minutes, until set. The edges will be a light golden brown. Test using a knife, 1" from the edge.

Have the filling prepared for when the crust is ready. In a large bowl, combine and whisk together the brown sugar, flour, and salt.

Add and beat in well, the corn syrup, eggs, and vanilla. Stir in the pecans. Spread the filling evenly over the hot crust.

Bake for 30 minutes until set. Test using a knife, 1" from the edge.

Let cool completely, then chill for 30 minutes.

The bars will be ready to be cut.

Store in an air-tight container, for up to 4 days, Chilled. These are so good with a hot cup of coffee or as a take and go snack. Enjoy!

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also expected to be completed by the end of the year.

•Community College Housing. Kansas City, Kansas, Community College will build 100,000 square feet of student housing which will be part of a larger college master plan. The estimated cost will be \$20 million.

•Scavuzzo's Food Service. This is to be built in four phases and will include 266,000 square feet of floor space. Other retail and commercial development is planned. This will be a \$115- million project and be built on the former Indian Springs Shopping Center site.

•American Royal. This is to include 164,000 square feet of floor space for a livestock expo arena, 250,000 square feet of floor space for a livestock exhibition hall, 5,000 square feet of office floor space and 6,500 square feet of floor space for an Agriculture Education Center. This would be a \$200 million investment. This would be in Village West, just west of Legends Outlet.

•Bonner Crossing. This would include an esports stadium, an amphitheater and retail and residential development. The estimated cost would be \$500 million; it would be at the southwest corner of 118th Street and State Avenue.

Kindle said all of this development does not include anything from two traditional sources—General Motors and the University of Kansas Medical Center.
