## Death of Meredith Roberts Schraeder is a Loss to the Community

I was saddened to learn of the recent death of Meredith Roberts Schraeder. She had suffered for several years from leukemia and complications following a bone marrow transplant. She was a few days from her 74<sup>th</sup> birthday.

I first met Meredith in the early 1970s when she was public information officer for the City of Kansas City, Kansas. It was a very challenging time for her as the newly elected Mayor, Richard Walsh, was on a political house-cleaning binge; the mayor fired Meredith's predecessor, Nancy Jack, who was aligned with the previous Mayor, Joe McDowell. Nancy was very

popular with reporters and a very trusted source.

Meredith was a quick learner and rose above the political fray. It didn't take long for her to win the confidence of reporters. When Jack Reardon defeated Mayor Walsh in 1975, he chose to keep Meredith. During her stint at City Hall, she and Larry Hancks of the City Planning Department, co-authored a book entitled "Roots" which told of the architectural history of Wyandotte County; it was a project of the Kansas City, Kansas, Bicentennial Commission.

In the late 1970s, I helped Meredith found the Grand Central, a newspaper serving the 10,000 homes on and near Central Avenue. She also was a public relations counselor with a company aptly named "MRS."

During the mid-1990s, Meredith served as the first

Executive Director of Business West. In the late 1990s, she was part of a reform slate that was elected to the Kansas City, Kansas, Board of Education.

Meredith was an active volunteer with several organizations including the Wyandotte Players, the Historic Westheight Neighborhood Association, the Junior League of Wyandotte and Johnson Counties and Trinity United Methodist Church.

Surviving family members include her husband Jim, her daughter, Laura Schraeder Madden and her husband Justin Madden and their daughter Lydia.

The family is planning a memorial service this fall. The family has suggested that memorial contributions be made to the National Marrow Donor Program. That would be most appropriate.

# Kansas x 13

Here's a fun fact: The 50 Democrats in the U.S. Senate represent 41.5 million more people than the 50 Senate Republicans. That equals 13 states with the population of Kansas and means that when you learn that a Senate vote was, say, 50 Democrats for and 50 Republicans against, the Democrats spoke for a lot more people—and that's not counting .72 million residents of the District of Columbia and 3.6 million in territories who have no senators.

This imbalance is growing worse as more people move to cities and their suburbs where opportunities are greater and out of rural areas where they aren't. Numbers paint the picture: in 1900, 40% of Americans lived in cities and 60% in rural areas; in 2000, we were 78% urban and 22% rural; in 2020, the ratio was 81 to 19.


Urbanization will continue, so the question is how long Americans in our larger states should put up with growing political inequality. The problem is the Senate, with two members per state regardless of population, and the Electoral College where Senate seats give an outsized voice to small states. Changing the Constitution to correct these imbalances is unlikely, so other steps are needed.

An obvious step would be to admit D.C. as a state, and bills to do so are now in the House and Senate. The Electoral College can be fixed by the Compact of the States, an agreement among states to cast all their electoral votes for the winner of the presidential popular vote. Currently, states with 196 of the necessary 270 votes have signed on. A more radical step could be to turn cities beyond some minimum size into states. New York City, L.A., Chicago, and Houston each have more than two million people, more than many states.

"One person, one vote" is the foundation of our freedom. Without that, we're doomed to live on George Orwell's *Animal Farm*, a satire on Stalinism where "All animals are equal, but some animals are more equal than others."

For now, we have to live with the Senate we have. In coming weeks, senators will consider major bills including the Biden-Harris request for pandemic relief to individuals and small businesses.

Also before the House and Senate is the For the People Act that would expand voting rights, limit money in politics, limit partisan gerrymandering, and strengthen ethics rules for federal officials. In federal elections, the act would require automatic voter registration, 15-day early voting, optional mail-in voting, online registration, voter-verified paper ballots, and easier voting access for the disabled and military and others overseas. The act would strictly limit foreign lobbying, require "dark money" organizations to disclose their donors, and require presidents, vice presidents, and candidates for those offices to disclose their last ten years' tax returns.



# SENATE NEWS

## Black History Month

February is Black History Month, a time devoted to celebrating and recognizing the central role of Black Americans in U.S. history. The Senate Democratic Caucus highlighted the following pioneering Black Kansans in our caucus on our Facebook and Twitter pages this week:

Senator Oletha Faust-Goudeau made history when she was elected to the Kansas House of Representatives in 2004. She became the first Black woman to represent the 84th district. Then, in 2008, she was elected as the first Black woman to ever serve in the Kansas Senate in Kansas history. She is also the first Black woman in state history to serve as Assistant Minority Leader.

Our most senior Senator David Haley is the son of the late Ambassador George Haley, who was the first Black man ever elected to the Kansas Senate. David's uncle, Alex Haley, is the author of *Roots* and co-author of *The Autobiography of Malcolm X*.

Carolyn Wims-Campbell in 2008 became the first Black woman elected to the State Board of Education, where she served two, four-year terms. She continues working during the Legislative session in the office of Senate Democratic Leader Dinah Sykes.

National Unclaimed Property Day:

February 1 was National

Unclaimed Property Day. The State of Kansas currently has more than \$400 million in unclaimed property. Types of property include bank accounts, wages, stocks, dividends, and utility deposits. Does any of it belong to you? Take a minute to find out by searching at [www.kansascash.ks.gov](http://www.kansascash.ks.gov). Be sure to search your current name, your maiden name, or any previous name you have used. This service is provided by the Kansas State Treasurer, and it is completely free. If you are asked to pay any kind of fee, then it is not the official Kansas website.

## Kansas Framework for Growth

Governor Laura Kelly and Lieutenant Governor David Toland were joined this week by former Kansas Governors John Carlin and Mike Hayden to unveil the state's Framework for Growth. The plan emphasizes:

- Talent development and retention
- Harnessing the state's colleges and universities for job and business creation
- Innovation as a driver of new business opportunity
- Community assets and regional approaches to economic development
- Policies to support long-term growth

Through the Framework for Growth, Kansas will be one of the first states in the nation to take a comprehensive look at the new normal beyond COVID-19 and develop a holistic strategy to guide state-level economic development policy.

## Medicaid Expansion

On Monday, Governor Kelly announced her proposal to pass Medicaid expansion this session. Medicaid Expansion is critical to Kansas' COVID-19 recovery. Expansion creates jobs, supports a healthy workforce, and improves struggling rural hospitals' bottom lines. If we don't expand Medicaid, we will forgo over \$10 billion in economic output in the next five years. For years, opponents to Medicaid Expansion have used the price tag as a scapegoat. Governor Kelly's bill addresses their problem by creating a medical marijuana program.

Medical marijuana would help Kansas recovery by bringing in sufficient revenue to Kansas and will

cover the cost of Medicaid expansion – while creating Kansas jobs. Kansas is one of three states left that does not permit some form of medical marijuana use, which leaves us less competitive and at a disadvantage. Medical marijuana helps Kansans with a chronic illness, children with seizures, and veterans suffering from PTSD, and it has been shown to reduce opioid use and drug-induced mortalities. With medical marijuana we can pay for Medicaid Expansion in Kansas with money left over.

## Unemployment Resources

This week, the Kansas Department of Labor deployed a new security system to fight unemployment insurance fraud. Under this updated system, every claimant will be required to verify his or her identity by answering questions specific to the person's credit history. Once an identity is verified, the system will prompt the claimant to set up two-factor authentication for her or his benefit account moving forward. This additional layer of security is an important factor in protecting KDOL unemployment insurance.

KDOL is continuing to aggressively monitor claims for fraudulent activity and is actively working with federal law enforcement officials to bring criminals to account. Since deploying this update, KDOL has successfully stopped over 576,000 suspected fraud logins. If you have received a 1099-G Tax Form and you did NOT receive unemployment benefits in 2020, you may be a victim of identity theft. Report this fraud to KDOL at [uiassistance.getkansasbenefits.gov](http://uiassistance.getkansasbenefits.gov) by selecting "Dispute my 1099" and make sure to include a copy of the Unsworn Declaration.

Since March 15, 2020 KDOL has paid out over 3.9 million weekly claims totaling over \$2.6 billion between regular unemployment and the federal pandemic programs. For more information, or to apply for unemployment benefits, go to [www.GetKansasBenefits.gov](http://www.GetKansasBenefits.gov).

## Find My Vaccine Tool

Governor Laura Kelly announced the launch of the "Find My Vaccine" mapping tool, designed to help Kansans locate sites that are administering vaccines in

their communities. The tool is available now on <https://kansasvaccine.gov>, Kansas's COVID-19 vaccine website. Kansans in vaccine phase 1 and 2 are recommended to use this tool as a resource for finding providers who are or will be offering the vaccine. "The 'find my vaccine' mapping tool allows any Kansan, regardless of where they live, to find the closest vaccine provider to their community.

Vaccines are being delivered to all 105 Kansas counties on a weekly basis, but not all providers may be listed on the map at this time. If you do not see an active location in your area -- and you are in Phase 1 or 2 --- ask your local health department how to access the vaccine. Weekly vaccine allocations for each county are available on the KS COVID-19 Vaccine Dashboard.

## National Wear Red Day

February 5, 2021

National Wear Red Day is designated to raise awareness among women about heart disease and stroke. My colleagues and I showed our support.

2020 Heart Disease & Stroke Statistics on Females and Cardiovascular Diseases (CVD):

- Among females age 20 and older between 2013 and 2016, 44.7% had some form of cardiovascular disease.

- Among females age 20 and older between 2013 and 2016, 43.4% of non-Hispanic (NH) whites had CVD; 57.1% of NH blacks, 42.6% of Hispanics, and 37.2% of NH Asians.

- In 2017, CVD was the cause of death in 418,665 females (all ages). Females represented 48.7% of deaths from CVD.

- In 2017, CVD was the disease with the highest percent of total deaths for all subgroups of females; 30.3% of all NH white female deaths, 32.6% of NH black female deaths, 28.5% of Hispanic female deaths, and 31.8% of NH Asian female deaths.

- In 2016, CVD was the first listed diagnosis of 2.2 million females discharged from short-stay hospitals.

- In 2014, 25.3% of bypass and 32.3% of percutaneous coronary intervention patients were female.

Contributing factors that add to a woman's vulnerability for heart disease and strokes:

- Smoking
- Physical Inactivity
- Overweight and Obesity
- Diabetes

## What is Sexual Violence

Sexual violence is any sexual act that is perpetrated against someone's will.

Sexual violence includes a range of offenses, such as a completed non-consensual sex act (rape), an attempted non-consensual sex act, abusive sexual contact (unwanted touching), and non-contact sexual abuse (threatened sexual violence, exhibitionism, verbal sexual harassment).

All types of sexual violence involve victims who do not consent, or who are unable to consent, or who refuse to allow the act.

Refer victims to the Kansas Crisis Hotline at 888-END-ABUSE (888-363-2287) and the local sexual and domestic violence victim advocacy organization serving their community.

The For the People Act passed the House last year but Mitch McConnell ignored it in the Senate. Now that Democrats set the agenda, it will be considered, but current Senate rules require 60 votes for most bills. Why? Because the filibuster, long used to preserve racist state laws, requires 60 to overcome, enabling the minority party to block majority legislation. When the

majority fails to get much done, voters throw them out and bring in the minority. Then, the cycle repeats in the opposite direction.

Changing a Senate rule requires only a simple majority. Those liking the filibuster claim it's traditional and promotes compromise. Traditional, yes; promotes compromise, no. It promotes inaction, blockade, and polarization. It's time to end the filibuster rule so the majority can rule, especially because they represent 41.5 million more of us.

The Kansas Chamber of Commerce has proposed one of the more controversial bills which would provide tax relief to Kansas businesses and also provide relief to Kansans paying higher state taxes because of federal tax changes. Governor Laura Kelly vetoed a similar bill two years ago. Critics, including Democrat and moderate Republicans, have said this reminds them of the disastrous tax cuts of the Governor Sam Brownback era. The present issue has passed the Kansas Senate earlier this year.

There are two bills that focus on sports betting. One is backed by casino interests; the other is broader and would allow convenience stores to benefit.

Mike Taylor, a lobbyist for the Unified Government, said the chairman of the committee handling STAR bonds legislation, State Senator Rob Olson from Olathe, favors the use of STAR bonds for economic development. Legislators

have criticized STAR bonds because they have been abused. However, the proper use of the bonds has been demonstrated with such developments as Legends Outlets.

Taylor said any legislation that might restrict the use of STAR bonds would not affect those being used for the Homefield development; those bonds were grandfathered. Homefield is being developed on property where Schlitterbahn was. With STAR bonds, developers use sale tax revenue to pay for infrastructure.

There was discussion about the cyberattack on the Kansas Department of Labor. Hackers broke into the computerized records of thousands of Kansans, acquiring their Social Security numbers and have filed false claims. Estimates are that more than \$70 million has left the state. Many people with legitimate unemployment claims have been shut out.

## AAA: Important to Protect Home Pipes from Deep Freeze

With the coldest temperatures of the season in the forecast this weekend and next week, and families in a work/school from home routine, frozen or burst pipes can be a frustrating disruption. With periods of brutally cold weather, pipes are at risk of freezing due to sudden temperature drops, poor insulation or incorrect thermostat settings.

"Freezing temperatures put your pipes at risk, and recovery can be difficult and costly," said Dan Scroggins, managing director of AAA Insurance. "Copper, iron and plastic pipes can burst. A crack as small as 1/8-inch can spew up to 250 gallons of water per day, causing flooding, serious structural damage, and the potential for mold."

With two months of winter left and more frigid weather likely in the weeks ahead, AAA offers the following tips to prevent pipes from freezing and bursting and for managing home insurance claims should the problem occur:

### Preventing Frozen Pipes:

- Make sure everyone in your family knows where the water shut-off valve is and how it works.
- Insulate pipes in your home's crawl spaces and attic.
- Seal gaps around pipes that allow cold air inside. You also should look for air leaks around electrical wiring, clothes dryer vents and pipes. Use caulk or insulation to keep the cold out.
- Disconnect garden hoses. If possible, use an indoor valve to shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets. This reduces the chance that pipes inside the house will freeze.
- If a freeze is expected, consider allowing warm water to drip slightly overnight, preferably from a faucet on an outside wall. Even a slight trickle may keep your pipes from freezing.
- When there is the possibility of a freeze, don't turn down the thermostat at bedtime. Instead, maintain the same setting day and night. Drops in temperature, which are more common overnight, could freeze your pipes.
- Open cabinet doors. This will allow heat to reach uninsulated pipes located under sinks.
- If you're going on vacation or leaving your home for an extended period of time, consider maintaining minimal heat to prevent freezing.

### Recovering from Frozen Pipes:

- If you turn on your faucets and nothing comes out, your pipes are likely frozen.
- You may be able to use a hair dryer to thaw a frozen pipe. Begin by warming the section of pipe closest to the faucet, then work your way out toward the coldest part of the pipe.
- Never use a hair dryer or any electrical appliances in areas of standing water. You could be electrocuted.
- Never try to thaw a pipe with a torch or other open flame. It could cause a fire.
- If your water pipes have already burst, turn off the water at the main shutoff valve in the house, leave the water faucets turned on, and call a plumber.

### Managing Home Insurance Claims

- Make a list of the damaged articles and take photos.
- Save the receipts for what you spend—including additional living expenses if you must leave your home until repairs are completed—and submit them to your insurance company for reimbursement.
- Standard homeowners policies will cover most of the kinds of damage that result from a freeze. For example, if house pipes freeze and burst or if ice forms in gutters and causes water to back up under roof shingles and seep into the house. You would also be covered if the weight of snow or ice damages your house.
- If your home sustains water damage, it is important to make sure that it is properly dried and repaired to prevent any potential problem with mold. Remember, mold cannot survive without moisture.
- Check with your agent or insurance company to be sure of what your policy covers.

"Prevention is the key to protecting your home this winter—especially with more families at home due to COVID-19 closures. A few simple steps can help you avoid a frozen pipes nightmare," continued AAA Insurance's Scroggins. "For added peace of mind, it's a good idea to make sure you have adequate homeowners insurance should the situation arise."

## Fox Business Network Cancels "Lou Dobbs Tonight"

Friday February 8th, the FOX News network said it was cancelling the "Lou Dobbs Tonight," from its line-up of business and financial news programs. This came one day after FOX, Dobbs and two other program hosts were named in a \$2.7 Billion dollar lawsuit brought by Smartmatic, the voting machine manufacturer. 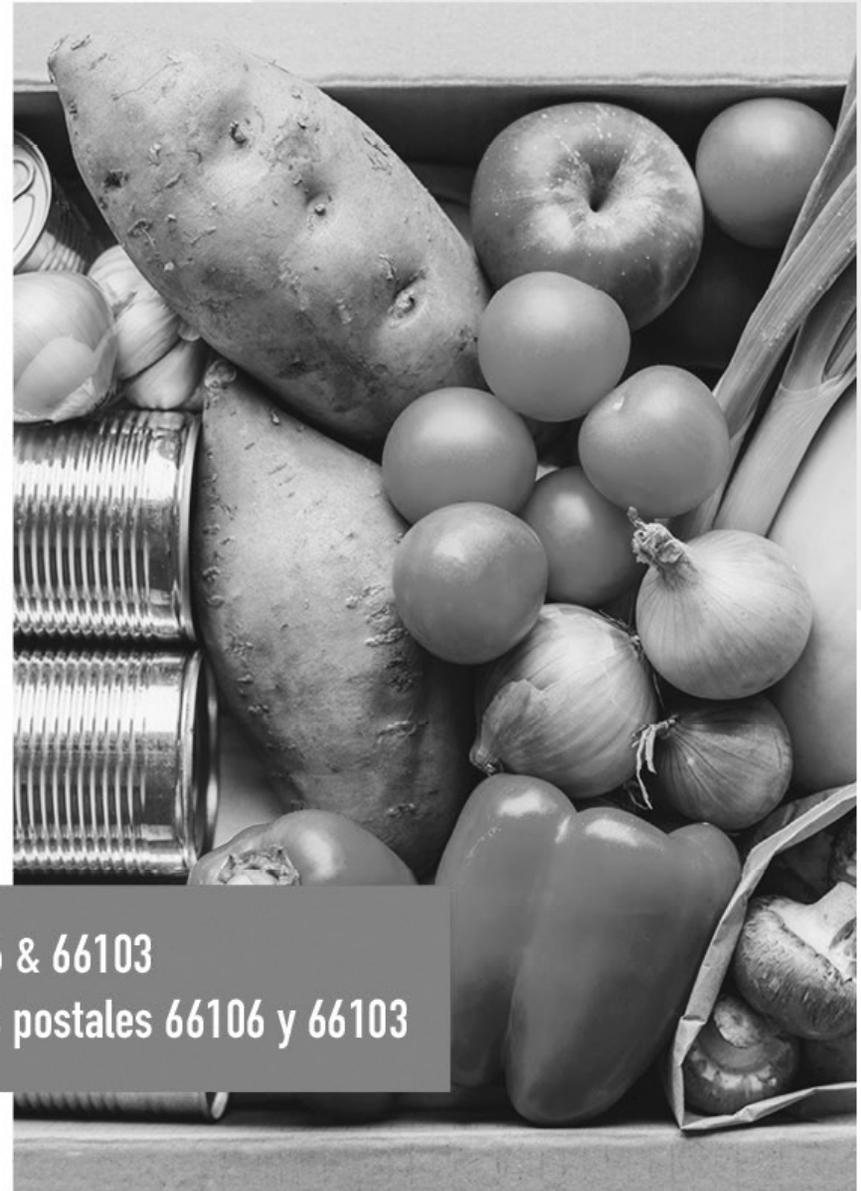
Some who still support the former president have falsely claimed that as a private citizen, he cannot be impeached. This is incorrect for the following reasons:
