TOPEKA – Governor Laura Kelly today announced the official launch of CONNEX™ Kansas, a new program from Kansas Manufacturing Solutions (KMS) and the Kansas Department of Commerce, designed to strengthen the Kansas manufacturing supply chain.

CONNEX™ Kansas is an online manufacturer database and connectivity platform provided as a free resource for Kansas manufacturers. The platform is designed to allow manufacturers in Kansas to connect with each other, find local and domestic suppliers, explore production capabilities and manage their supply chain.

Vaccine and Testing Clinics Continue Statewide

Vaccine and Testing events will continue to be held in several counties across the state over the coming weeks

TOPEKA – With the increased presence of the Delta variant in Kansas, local health departments, providers, and community groups are continuing to hold free COVID-19 vaccine and testing clinics. The emergence of the Delta variant poses a dangerous risk to communities across Kansas. On August 23, 2021, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine (also known as Comirnaty) for people 16 years of age and older.

The Pfizer vaccine continues to be available through emergency use authorization for people 12-15 years of age and for the administration of a third dose in moderately or severely immunocompromised people and those at high risk of infection because of an occupational or institutional setting.

Additionally, the FDA’s emergency use authorization covers patients age 18 and older to receive the Moderna and Johnson & Johnson vaccines. Moderna began the application for full FDA approval in June, nearly a month after Pfizer/BioNTech. Full approval is anticipated in several weeks. Johnson & Johnson has stated they will begin the approval process later this year.

As of October 4, 2021, 51.8% of Kansans have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.

The events listed below are part of a sustained effort to mobilize Kansans to get vaccinated and/or tested to stop the spread of COVID-19 to protect themselves and loved ones. Free testing is available to everyone in Kansas, regardless of vaccination status and even if you have been tested before.

The vast majority of new COVID-19 cases in the State of Kansas are the Delta variant. This variant continues to cause the number of cases to rise at the level that was seen in November 2020.

The Delta variant is highly contagious, more than twice as contagious as previous variants. The greatest concern is for those who are unvaccinated. Data shows that this variant causes more severe illness in people who are unvaccinated. The COVID-19 vaccines reduce a person’s risk of contracting the virus, including this variant. Additionally, it has been shown to prevent severe disease and death.

Taxpayers interacting with the IRS have the right to finality. This right comes into play for taxpayers who are going through an audit. These taxpayers have the right to know when the IRS has finished the audit. This is one of ten basic rights — known collectively as the Taxpayer Bill of Rights.

Here’s what taxpayers in the process of an audit, should know about their right to finality:

- Taxpayers have the right to know:
- The maximum amount of time they have to challenge the IRS’s position.
- The maximum amount of time the IRS has to audit a particular tax year or collect a tax debt.
- When the IRS has finished an audit.

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

- The IRS generally has three years from the date taxpayers file their returns to assess any additional tax for that tax year.

- There are some limited exceptions to the three-year rule, including when taxpayers fail to file returns for specific years or file false or fraudulent returns. In these cases, the IRS has an unlimited amount of time to assess tax for that tax year.

- The IRS generally has 10 years from the assessment date to collect unpaid taxes. This 10-year period cannot be extended, except for taxpayers who enter into installment agreements or the IRS obtains court judgments.

- There are circumstances when the 10-year collection period may be suspended. This can happen when the IRS cannot collect money due to the taxpayer's bankruptcy or there's an ongoing collection due process proceeding involving the taxpayer.

- A statutory notice of deficiency is a letter proposing additional tax the taxpayer owes. This notice must include the deadline for filing a petition with the tax court to challenge the amount proposed.

- Generally, a taxpayer will only be subject to one audit per tax year. However, the IRS may reopen an audit for a previous tax year, if the IRS finds it necessary. This could happen, for example, if a taxpayer files a fraudulent return.

Tom's Tasty Treat

It's been a while since there has been a good candy recipe, as a tasty treat. That's exactly why this coconut treat was selected to be this week's tasty treat! And there's nothing to making these Chocolate candies and there's only three ingredients. These are going to be hard to resist:

Tom's Chocolate Covered Coconut Tempters!

Ingredients:

2 1/2 c Shredded Coconut
3/4 c Sweetened Condensed Milk
1 1/2 c Dark Chocolate Chips

Directions:

Line a 9x9" square pan with parchment paper, extending the paper up the sides.

In a bowl, combine the shredded coconut and the sweetened condensed milk. Stir the mixture until blended well. If it seems a little dry, add a little more of the sweetened condensed milk.

Pour the mixture into the pan and press into place with a spatula. Then compress the coconut with the bottom of a drinking glass. Cover with foil and freeze for one hour.

Line a tray or small cookie sheet with parchment paper or wax paper.

Remove the candy from the pan and with a sharp knife, cut the candy into small squares or rectangles.

Melt the chocolate and remove from the stove. With a fork, dip each piece into the melted chocolate and place on the tray lined with parchment. Before the chocolate sets, go over each candy and with a fork, impress the chocolate to make a pattern.

Chill the candy for ten minutes and it's ready.

Store it in an air-tight container and keep chilled until serving. Place a sheet of wax paper between layers.

Variations:

Add a light coating of chopped pecans or dried cranberries to the pan before pouring in the coconut mixture. Use semi-sweet, milk, or white chocolate as you like. For the kids, sprinkle with multi-color cupcake decors, or after dipping each piece into the melted chocolate, place a Pecan half on the top.

Most everyone loves these coconut candies, and the sweetened condensed milk adds its own flavor to these easy to make treats. Enjoy!
