Our planet is in desperate trouble. Last summer, Phoenix, Arizona, had 50 days of 110+ temperatures, and the two Colorado River reservoirs that provide power and water for irrigation and communities in the Southwest are critically low and dropping lower. The day will come, sooner rather than later, when some areas become unlivable and farming impossible.

media, for our elected officials, and for the

private sector.

Also last summer, a three-week heat wave 30 degrees above normal reached 116 in Oregon, 108 in Seattle, and 121 in British Columbia. More than 1,400 people died, and damage was at least \$9 billion.

Just last month, Britain had record temperatures of 104 degrees and the London fire brigade had its busiest day since the bombings of World War II. One suburban area was completely burned—this in a country where 90 degrees was rare just 20 years ago.

Ice melt in Greenland last month was so fast that one week's melt was enough to cover the state of West Virginia in a foot of water. A 120+ heat wave in India killed 2,300, among the deadliest heat waves in recorded history. Closer to home, St. Louis and Kentucky had their worst flooding ever; warmer air holds more moisture.


The scientists who foresaw this decades ago were right. Not only were they right, but many were too conservative in their estimates of how soon climate effects would worsen. We're in a slow-motion emergency that will inevitably get worse day by day. How much worse depends on how quickly we stop using fossil fuels and switch to sustainable energy sources. In the battle to save our planet, switching slowly equals losing.

Only a few thousand people in the world have the power to facilitate substantial, rapid change: heads of governments, legislators, corporate CEOs, energy scientists, private sector financiers. Unfortunately, for decades, America has had the world's only major political party populated by climate change deniers who have repeatedly opposed legislation to lower greenhouse gas emissions. Some of them, faced with climate catastrophes in their states, are now beginning to see the light. Better late than never.

Now comes a Democratic bill that is easily "the greatest pro-climate legislation that has ever been passed by Congress," according to Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer. Predicted to cut carbon emissions, compared to 2005, by 40% by 2030, within striking distance of President Biden's—and scientists'—goal of 50%, the bill provides tax incentives for wind, solar, geothermal, battery, and other clean energy for ten years, financial incentives for nuclear power plants to stay online, and incentives to capture and bury industrial emissions.

The bill includes tax credits for buying new and used electric vehicles and rebates to install heat pumps and other energy-saving home improvements. (The bill also reduces prescription drug costs and health insurance costs for millions and raises taxes on major corporations, many of which pay little or no federal taxes.) Early this week, the bill had not yet passed both houses of Congress but appears likely to do so even without Republican support.

What can we do to save the Earth for our grandchildren and beyond? For starters, vote in November for candidates who have a record of supporting pro-climate policies. Surely, it's one issue we should all agree on.




My chicken was grilled and a little dry, the potatoes were good but the spinach side dish with tomatoes was to die for.

AG Derek Schmidt announces agreement to eliminate jewelry debt, recover refunds for Kansas servicemembers

TOPEKA – Kansas reached a jewelry company used deceptive the course of the investigation. settlement on behalf of more than 1,300 Kansas consumers, mostly servicemembers and veterans, who were defrauded by national jewelry retailer Harris Jewelry, Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt said today.

The settlement was part of a nationwide effort involving 18 states. including Kansas, and the Federal Trade Commission, resulting in the recovery of \$34.2 million for more than 46,000 servicemembers and veterans nationwide.

Schmidt said the New York-based

marketing tactics to lure active duty servicemembers to their financing program, falsely claiming that investing in the program would improve their credit scores. Instead, servicemembers were tricked into obtaining high-interest loans on overpriced, poor quality jewelry that left servicemembers with thousands of dollars of debt and damaged their credit. Harris Jewelry operated retail stores near and on military installations nationwide, including in Manhattan, near Fort Riley. The Kansas location was closed during

According to the terms of the settlement, Harris Jewelry will cease collecting debt payments, totaling \$293,857.03, and refund \$342,905.58 for protection plan fees, for approximately 1,350 Kansas consumers, the vast majority of whom were military members or their families. Harris Jewelry is also required to correct bad credit scores of consumers and dissolve all of its businesses.

Harris Jewelry's business model was designed to primarily target and service people in the military. Aprevious multi-state investigation found that local servicemembers were enticed into retail stores through a marketing scheme,

dubbed "Operation Teddy Bear," in which Harris Jewelry advertised teddy bears in military uniforms with promises of charitable donations. Investigators found that no legal contract was actually signed between Harris Jewelry and the charity it claimed to support, and consumers were often given varying and conflicting information about the amount donated to the charity.

Schmidt said Harris Jewelry then used this charity connection as a marketing tactic to lure servicemembers into high-priced, deceptive in-house financing contracts for vastly overpriced jewelry, which included finance contracts with

Merrick Garland Attorney General: We have been moving urgently since the beginning and have a huge number of prosecutors and agents working these cases.

Lester Holt, NBC news:

You said in no uncertain terms that no one was above the Law.

Garland: Yes.

Holt: That said, the indictment of a former president, perhaps the next candidate for president, would arguably tear the country apart. Is that your concern as you make your decision, do you have to think about that?"

Garland: We pursue justice without fear or favor. We intend to hold everyone -- anyone who was criminally responsible for events surrounding January 6 or any attempt to interfere with the lawful transfer of power from one Administration to another, accountable. That's what we do. We don't pay any attention to other issues with respect to that.

Holt: So, if Donald Trump was to become a candidate for president again, that wouldn't change your schedule, or how you move forward or don't move forward?

Garland: I'll say again, that we will hold accountable anyone who is criminally responsible for attempting to interfere with the transfer, legitimate, lawful transfer of power from one Administration to the next.

Early last week, the Washington Post reported that the Justice Department is investigating former president Trump's actions in its criminal probe. Prosecutors who have questioned two top aides to Vice president Pence, Mark Short and Greg Jacob. The men were questioned for hours at the DOJ

before a Grand jury.

At the June 6 public hearing, Jacob a lawyer for Pence and was the star witness at that hearing. Jacob told about his having helped Pence fend off Donald Trump's effort to "Deputize" him to disrupt the transfer of power to Joe Biden.

According to the Washington Post these aides to Vice president Pence were also asked the instructions that Trump had given his lawyers and advisors about Fake Electors and sending certified Electors back to their States.

hidden fees and payments tied directly to the military pay days.
