Voting Begins October 22

An election is our opportunity to choose honest, thoughtful people dedicated to the rule of law and to the common good. The well-respected Mainstream Coalition, through its political action arm MainPAC, rates candidates and issues according to how well they share MainPAC's priorities for moderate government including:

- Transparency in government
- Access to healthcare
- Public education
- Separation of government and religion
- Access to voting
- LGBTQ equality
- Reproductive rights

Ratings follow (candidate percentages reflect their support for MainPAC priorities; I=incumbent).

Kansas Supreme Court

MainPAC recommends voting "Yes" to retain all Supreme Court Justices.

Kansas Constitutional Amendments

MainPac recommends voting "No" to both proposed Amendments: (1) to give the Legislature the power to suspend, with a simple majority, regulations of state agencies such as the Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Education, Department

of Agriculture, and others, and (2) to mandate the election of county sheriffs, preventing local governments from choosing to do differently and transferring power to initiate a sheriff recall from local district attorneys to the state attorney general.

Looking Back

In February of the 8th grade, my schoolmate at Holy Family grade school was going to DeLasalle Academy High school to take a entrance exam. He asked me if I wanted to go: his father was driving. I really had no interest in taking the exam nor attending there. The school was too far from home and my family could not afford the costs of their tuition and the military uniforms. What caught my attention was that the school would provide free lunch and the use of the firing range after the test was taken.

I did decide to go that day; I did not prepare nor concern myself with the results of the test, and I would be home in time to deliver my newspapers in time. It had been two years since I had fired a rifle and I looked forward to the time on the firing range. I did not try when taking the test, and it showed. About 3 weeks later, I received a letter from the school. It informed that approximately 200 students had taken the test and they would only accept the top 150 – I was the 151st rated student.

That subject would come up two years later. Bobby Hepler called and wanted us to go walking on a sunny Sunday about 1 in the afternoon. He was getting anxious about school starting soon. He went to DeLasalle military prep school and the Christian Brothers who taught there were hard on him. I was going to start my junior year in high school. We met and started walking north on 6th Street. Soon

Second Annual Wyco Dumpster Days

The Unified Government's Public Works Department is excited to announce the second WyCo Dumpster Days event of 2022. Dumpster Days is an event to help residents recycle electronics waste for a fee and dispose of unwanted bulky items like old mattresses and furniture for free.

The event will be held at Wyandotte County Park (126th & State Avenue) in Bonner Springs, Kansas, on October 21 & 22 from 8 AM

to Noon.

Visitors will need to show proof of Wyandotte County residency with something displaying their name and address, like a driver's license or utility bill.

Items accepted include electronics recycling, mattresses, furniture, refrigerators, general appliances, fixtures, microwaves, freezers, televisions, and more.

For televisions, computer screens,

flat screens, and monitors, the following fees are charged:

- CRT Computer Screens, \$40
- LCD/Flat Screen TVs, \$20
- CRT TVs, \$40

Cash only. Exact change is required. For the complete list of accepted electronics recycling, visit wycokck.org/DumpsterDays.

Items that cannot be accepted include:

- All household hazardous waste
- Paint
- Yard waste
- Batteries
- Storm debris
- Food waste
- Medical waste
- Glass & plastics recycling
- Tires
- Construction or demolition material
- Any item from businesses, non-profits, or other commercial entities

These items will be turned away at the event, so remember not to bring them!

For yard waste, storm debris, and glass or paper recycling, residents may use the Recycling & Yard Waste Center at 3241 Park Drive, Kansas City, KS 66102, at no charge. The Recycling & Yard Waste Center is open from 10 AM to 3 PM Thursday through Sunday to November 20 and every Saturday from December 3 to March 26, 2023. The center is closed on holidays.

Man, I thought as he laughed and choked at the same time – he thinks this is funny, that I came in 151st place. I didn't think it was that funny, but soon I was also laughing. The owner of the store didn't think it was funny; he was now staring us down.

Soon Bobby was headed for the door. He stood outside next to the window pointing at me and laughing. Then he would start choking and hacking while standing on the sidewalk. 2023 Medicare Open Enrollment Begins October 15

Free Counseling Available from KDADS SHICK Program

TOPEKA – More than 540,000 Kansas residents receive health coverage through Medicare, and the time to review benefits is only days away. The program's fall open enrollment period, when you can make changes that take effect January 1, starts October 15, 2022 and runs through December 7, 2022.

"It's important that older adults make sure their current providers are still participating in their plan for 2023 and that the cost of any medications they need haven't increased," KDADS Medicare Program Manager Emily Blanch said. "Medicare beneficiaries can make changes to several aspects of their coverage and take the time to weigh all the coverage options available to them from various insurers. We encourage people to always take advantage of this time as all of us have health care needs that change over the course of a year and Medicare plans change as well."

By shopping available plans and comparing costs, beneficiaries may be able to find a Medicare health or drug plan with better coverage or a lower premium in 2023. The Medicare Plan Finder allows users to compare pricing between Original Medicare, Medicare prescription drug plans, Medicare Advantage plans, and Medicare Supplement Insurance (Medigap) policies.

During open enrollment, those currently enrolled may:

- Switch from original Medicare to Medicare Advantage, or vice versa
- Switch from one Medicare Advantage plan to another or from one Medicare Part D prescription drug plan to another

• If you didn't enroll in a Medicare Part D plan when you were first eligible, you can do so during open enrollment, although a late enrollment penalty may apply

If you want to enroll in a Medicare Advantage plan, you must meet some basic criteria:

- You must be enrolled in Medicare Part A and B
- You must live in the plan's service area
- If you're already enrolled in a

Medicare Part D prescription plan or a Medicare Advantage Plan and you don't want to make changes to your coverage for 2023, you don't need to do anything during open enrollment, assuming your current plan will still be available in 2023. If your plan is being discontinued and isn't eligible for renewal, you will receive a non-renewal notice from your carrier prior to open enrollment. If you don't, it means you can keep your plan without doing anything during open enrollment.

Be aware that benefits and premiums could be changing for 2023. So even if you're confident you want to keep your current coverage for the coming year, it's important to understand any changes that may apply and check to make sure your current plan is still the best available option. The available plans and what they cover change from one year to the next, so even if the plan you have now was the best option when you shopped last year, it's important to verify that again before you lock yourself in for another year.

Each year, there's a Medicare Advantage Open Enrollment Period from January 1 – March 31. During this time, if you're in a Medicare Advantage Plan and want to change your health plan, you can switch to a different Medicare Advantage Plan with or without drug coverage or go back to original Medicare and, if needed, also join a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan.

Changes to be aware of for 2023 include:

- There are 90 Medicare Advantage plans available in 2023, compared to 88 plans in 2022.
- 100 percent of people with Medicare have access to a Medicare Advantage plan.
- The average monthly Medicare Advantage plan premium saw a -20.6 percent change, from \$7.77 in 2022 to \$6.17 in 2023.
- 23 Medicare prescription drug plans are available with premiums varying from \$2.80 to \$112.60.
- 100 percent of people with a stand-alone Medicare prescription

drug plan have access to a plan with a lower premium than what they paid in 2022.

• Through the CMS Innovation Center's Value-Based Insurance Design (VID) Model, 20 plans will offer Medicare Advantage enrollees additional options, including reductions in cost sharing for certain covered benefits, such as eliminated Medicare Part D cost sharing; rewards and incentives programs related to healthy behaviors; and customized, innovative benefits that address social determinants of health, such as food insecurity and social isolation, for enrollees who receive low income subsidies and/or chronically ill enrollees.

SHICK has counselors throughout the state that can assist people, so they stay informed on changing conditions in health care insurance. Call 800-860-5260 for this free counseling service.

SHICK counselors receive training on Medicare, Medicare Supplement Insurance, Long-Term Care and other health insurance subjects that concern older Kansans. The counselors do not work for any insurance company, their goal is to educate and assist the public to make informed decisions on what's best for each individual situation.

KanDrive App now available on cell phones

TOPEKA - The Kansas Department of Transportation's KanDrive website is now also available to download as an App on Android and iOS (iPhone Operating System) cell phones. KanDrive provides travelers across the state timely details on maintenance and construction activities, winter highway conditions, flooded roadways, incidents and crashes affecting traffic.

The new App includes all account features on the KanDrive website but also includes a hands-free/eye-free feature that announces upcoming traffic events while traveling. Just tap the Tell Me sound icon in the top right corner to get announcements of upcoming events (feature requires location sharing).

"It's important for motorists to have quick, accurate and up-to-date information on highway conditions in Kansas," said Kevin Hennes, KDOT Administrator for KanDrive. "Having the new KanDrive App with your choices set up in advance is a convenient option to help you travel safely and stay informed."

All account features available on the KanDrive website are included on the App. It also offers real time, high-quality streaming of camera views across the state. The truckers' mode for commercial vehicle operators is still an option and now announces rest stop parking availability.

The Kansas 511 phone system also has been updated and simplified for people who prefer to receive real-time highway condition information by calling 511. The voice quality and speech recognition features have been improved, and motorists can ask for reports on a specific route, in a city or between two cities.
