## Ignoring vehicle recalls can be risky: Check To Protect

TOPEKA – More than 50 million vehicles on the nation’s roadways have unrepaired, open recalls that can lead to costly damages and put occupants at a safety risk. The Kansas Department of Transportation is joining the National Safety Council (NSC) in encouraging vehicle owners to use the Check To Protect program, which allows free repairs through an authorized dealer.

“What you don’t know can hurt you,” said Gary Herman, KDOT Behavioral Safety Manager, Bureau of Transportation Safety. “All car owners should regularly check for safety recalls, especially going into winter in Kansas. Failing vehicle parts can lead to life threatening injuries.”

The NSC warns vehicle owners to not assume recall notices will be sent by mail. Owners of older, used or vehicles not regularly seen for routine maintenance can be difficult to track down.

Checking a recall status should be part of routine vehicle maintenance and done at least twice a year. A vehicle license plate or the vehicle identification number (VIN) is required. VIN numbers are on the driver’s side dashboard or on vehicle registration/insurance documents. Then go to the Check To Protect website, <https://checktoprotect.org>. Anyone with a recall will be prompted to schedule a free repair at a dealer.

## Kansas’ October Total Tax Receipts Exceed Estimate By \$73.2M

*Marks the 27th Consecutive Month Kansas Has Exceeded Estimate*

TOPEKA—Governor Laura Kelly announced that October’s total tax receipts were \$740.1 million -- 11%, or \$73.2 million, above the estimate, and \$77.4 million, or 11.7%, more than October of last year. October marks the 27th month in a row in which the state has exceeded its estimated collections.

“For four years, my administration has worked relentlessly to help businesses grow and succeed, create quality jobs, and get our state back on track,” Governor Kelly said. “We laid the groundwork for what we’re seeing now: Nearly 30 months of strong revenues that have allowed us to responsibly cut taxes, pay off debts, fully

fund schools, invest in our law enforcement, and improve our roads and bridges.”

Individual income tax collections were \$357.5 million, which is \$52.5 million, or 17.2%, more than the estimate. That is \$55.9 million, or 18.6%, more than October 2021. Corporate income tax collections were \$32.5 million for the month. That is \$0.5 million, or 1.6%, less than the estimate and 18.9% less than October 2021. Corporate receipts for the first four months of FY 2023 are 7.6% greater than the same period in 2021.

Retail sales tax collections were \$251.7 million, which is 9.4%, or \$21.7 million, more than the estimate. Those collections are \$24.0 million, or 10.5%, more than last October. Compensating use tax collections were \$70.0 million, which is \$2.0 million, or 2.7%, less than the estimate, but 3.6% more than October 2021.

The Consensus Revenue Estimating Group (CRE), comprised of the Department of Revenue, Division of Budget, Legislative Research Department, and economists from the University of Kansas, Kansas State University, and Wichita State University, will meet on November 9th to review and possibly revise the FY 2023 estimate and make its initial forecast for FY 2024.

“Each time CRE has met over the past two years, we’ve raised our revenue forecasts, yet Kansas continues to beat the newer, higher forecasts every single month,” said Secretary of Revenue Mark Burghart.

## Nine Million People Who Missed Expanded Tax Benefits Still Have Time to File



More than nine million people may qualify for tax benefits but didn't claim them by filing a 2021 federal income tax return. Many in this group may be eligible to claim some or all of the 2021 recovery rebate credit, the child tax credit, the earned income tax credit and other tax credits. These and other tax benefits were expanded under last year's American Rescue Plan Act and other recent legislation.

The only way to get the valuable benefits is to file a 2021 tax return.

Often, people can get these expanded tax benefits, even if they have little or no income from a job, business or other source. This means that many people who don't normally need to file a tax return should do so for 2021, even if they haven't been

required to file in recent years.

Eligible people can file a tax return even if they don't receive a letter. There's no penalty for a refund claimed on a tax return filed after the regular April 2022 tax deadline.

The expanded tax benefits include:

- An expanded child tax credit. Families can claim this credit, even if they received monthly advance payments during the last half of 2021. The total credit can be as much as \$3,600 per child.
- A more generous earned income tax credit. The law boosted the EITC for childless workers. There are also changes that can help low- and moderate-income families with children. The credit can be as much as \$1,502 for workers with no qualifying children, \$3,618 for those with

one child, \$5,980 for those with two children and \$6,728 for those with at least three children.

• The recovery rebate credit. Those who missed out on last year's third round of Economic Impact Payments may be eligible to claim the RRC. Often referred to as stimulus payments, this credit can help eligible people whose third payment was less than the full amount, including those who welcomed a child in 2021. The maximum credit is \$1,400 for each qualifying adult, plus \$1,400 for each eligible child or adult dependent.

• An increased child and dependent care credit. Families who have care expenses for a child or dependent so they can work or look for work can get a tax credit worth up to \$4,000 for one qualifying person and \$8,000 for two or more qualifying persons.

• A deduction for gifts to charity. Most tax-filers who take the standard deduction can deduct eligible cash contributions they made during 2021. Married couples filing jointly can deduct up to \$600 in cash donations and individuals can deduct up to \$300 in donations. In addition, itemizers who make large cash donations often qualify to deduct the full amount in 2021.

Free File to stay open until November 17

To help people claim these benefits, Free File will remain open for an extra month this year, until November 17, 2022. People with income of \$73,000 or less can electronically file a return for free using brand-name software.

People can also visit ChildTaxCredit.gov to file a 2021 income tax return. Individuals with income below \$12,500 and couples with income below \$25,000 may be able to file a simple tax return to claim the 2021 Recovery Rebate Credit and the Child Tax Credit.

# Continued KDOT Staffing Shortages Could Impact Highway Snow, Ice Removal Efforts

The Kansas Department of Transportation is committed to keeping the highways cleared when inclement weather impacts the state, but staffing shortages continue to affect the agency with not enough snowplow operators in many areas. These ongoing shortages could affect KDOT's ability to clear snow and ice from highways in a timely manner.

"We want motorists to know ahead of time - it's not a matter of if the highways will be cleared this winter, but when," said Transportation Secretary Julie Lorenz. "KDOT

crews will be proactive by shifting crews and pretreating surfaces whenever possible but having fewer employees could cause delays in removing snow and ice from all the affected roadways."

The agency is about 24% short of snowplow operators needed to be fully staffed in offices across the state. However, all KDOT field offices have made preparations in September and October to be ready for winter - employees participated in regional meetings with several days of hands-on snowfighter training exercises. Salt, sand and

other materials are fully stocked, and pre-maintenance work on snowplows and other equipment is complete.

"Our maintenance crews always do their best to serve the public as they work 12-hour shifts in their efforts to clear the highways," said Secretary Lorenz. "But motorists can help by checking on road conditions and weather forecasts in advance and possibly delaying travel plans. It's important to plan ahead, stay informed and travel safe."

Before traveling, check [www.KanDrive.org](http://www.KanDrive.org), KDOT's road condition website - it is updated 24/7 for highway conditions, short-term closures and general traffic alerts, and provides camera views to see

current road conditions in that area. KanDrive now has a new App available for download on iOS and Android phones with a hands-free/eye-free feature to announce upcoming traffic events while traveling. The Kansas 511 phone system also has been updated and provides reports on a specific route, in a city or between two cities.

The agency also will deploy all employees who have a Commercial Driver's License (CDL) to plow snow and hire seasonal employees. KDOT will assist selected applicants in obtaining a CDL upon hiring, which includes providing training. 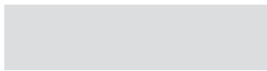

# Tom's Tasty Treats

A great ingredient that isn't used as much as it should be is sweetened condensed milk (SCM). This week's recipe will add to its usefulness in baking. It really gives a lot of richness and flavor to anything it's used in. Try with a small drop of raspberry or apricot preserves added to each after very lightly tapping the scoop of dough, delicious! Or, adapt these wonderful cookies by switching the flavorings and the additions that you add.

And these are great for frosting and decorating with sprinkles, multi-color sugars, and dragees. Add coloring to the dough and to the frosting as desired.

Please, bake some soon.

## TOM'S S.C.M. BUTTER COOKIES

Ingredients:

- 1 c Butter
  - 1 c Sweetened Condensed Milk
  - 4 c Flour
  - 1 T Baking Powder
  - 1/2 t Vanilla\*
  - 1/4 Butter extract, optional
- Set oven to 325°.

Line 2 cookie sheets with parchment paper.

In a stand mixer, beat the butter until light and fluffy, at least 3 minutes. Add the sweetened condensed milk and beat for another 1 1/2 minutes, scapula down the bowl as needed. Beat in the Vanilla. In a large bowl, combine and whisk together the flour, salt, and baking powder. Add it to the butter mixture and mix until just combined.

If adding ingredients, fold them in by hand. Take care to not over work the dough. If the dough is too wet to scoop, cover and chill for twenty minutes. With a tablespoon sized scoop or with a tablespoon drop dough 2" apart on the cookie sheet. Tap tops and place a drop of preserves on each cookie. Leave without the preserves if frosting the cookies. Bake at 325° for 10-12 minutes. Let cool for 5 minutes then, place on racks to cool completely.

\*\*Variations:

Instead of Vanilla, try lemon or orange extract and a little grated rind. Almond extract is very strong so use 1/4 t and incorporate 1/2 c of sliced or slivered almonds. Try with a cup of mini chocolate chips, or butterscotch chips. And dried cranberries or cherries are always good.
