

Wyandotte County Seniors Over 65 Now Eligible for COVID-19 Vaccines

Vaccines will be prioritized for those at highest risk; plus, new mass vaccination site is up and running

Beginning this week, the Unified Government Public Health Department (UGPHD) is scheduling seniors age 65 and older who live in Wyandotte County for COVID-19 vaccinations. Highest priority will be given for seniors who live in zip codes 66101, 66102, and 66105.

Vaccine zip code prioritization is based on the County's COVID-19 Vulnerability Index, developed by the UGPHD

The index is meant to make vaccine distribution more equitable and help prioritize vaccines for residents at higher risk of exposure to the

virus and serious illness or death from COVID-19. The Index prioritizes based on zip codes in which many residents do not have health insurance, and where there have been the highest number of COVID-19 cases.

Seniors in Wyandotte County who want to be vaccinated must fill out the UGPHD's Vaccine Interest Form. The survey can be found online at ughealth.info/vaccine, or by going to wycokck.org/COVID-19 and clicking on COVID-19 Vaccines. From there, click on the large button that says "Fill Out the Vaccine Interest Form". The form is available in both English and Spanish. For those without an internet connection, please call 3-1-1 for assistance in filling out the form. Once you have filled out the form, you'll receive updates as to when you are eligible for a vaccine, how to make an appointment, etc.

New Vaccination and Testing Site Now Open

A mass vaccination facility near the Legends is now open in Western Wyandotte County, in addition to the central location at 78th and State Ave. Both of these mass vaccination sites offer vaccines by appointment only, Monday – Friday, 9 AM – 3 PM. They also offer saliva testing kits, which are available Monday – Friday, 9 AM – 3 PM, on a walk-in basis.

Natural Marvels, Unnatural Disaster

Holy icicles! The recent polar cold spell was too frigid and too long. My Wife the English Teacher and I tried to make the best of it by not leaving home for a week and by filling bird feeders to help our feathered friends survive.

Regular sunflower seed customers include chickadees, tufted titmice (titmouse comes from the Old English *mase*, meaning "small bird"), juncos, sparrows,



cardinals, and blue jays. Suet is a hit with two nuthatches, a pair of Carolina wrens, four downy woodpeckers, a hairy woodpecker, a yellow-bellied sapsucker, and a large red-bellied woodpecker who chases away other diners. In the suet pecking order, he's first.

A favorite is a tiny red-breasted nuthatch (pictured), blue and gray above and orange below with a white face striped in black. Like other nuthatches, it's usually head down as it navigates trees. Like other birds, it's one of nature's marvels.

Another of nature's marvels is us, *homo sapiens*, who last week landed the robotic explorer *Perseverance* on Mars after a 300-million-mile journey. The 2200-pound mobile laboratory will look for signs of ancient microbial life and for why it may have died off. *Perseverance* will drill and analyze rock samples then scatter them on the ground to be returned to Earth for further study by a later mission.

Watching NASA staff at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in California during the tense minutes before landing then when they applauded their success was a rare joy. Their happiness in their triumph was inspiring. Science works.

Not a triumph is the epic man-made energy disaster in Texas. While most of the country weathered the frigid storms with little disruption thanks to the power of science providing power, Texans suffered from a decades-old political decision to divorce most of the state from the national electricity grid, the only lower-48 state to go it alone.

Why, you ask? Because Texas legislators wanted to avoid federal regulations that apply to the interstate grid. Regulations ensure reliability but cost money, and the politicians' goals were cheap electricity, energy company profits (and campaign donations), and allegiance to their anti-government ideology.

When the cold came, poorly insulated gas wellheads and pipelines, coal piles, and unheated wind turbines froze; a nuclear plant went offline; power demand exceeded supply; and the state's isolated grid was minutes from collapse. The only choice was to shut off power to millions of customers for days. No heat, no light, no water; groceries and gas stations closed; pipes froze and burst.

With angry citizens freezing in the dark and some dying, Republicans, who've run Texas for more than a generation, tried to shift blame. Former Governor and Secretary of Energy Perry said, "Texans would be without electricity for longer than three days to keep the federal government out of their business." Governor Abbott tried to blame "liberals" who favor wind and solar energy, never mind that they supply only 12% of Texas winter energy and that winterized wind turbines in colder climates worked just fine. Texas Senator Ted Cruz went full jackass and fled to a warm Mexican resort.

Meanwhile, in the world of caring and compassion, "liberal" New York Congressperson Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez raised more than \$4 million for Texas relief, and President Biden quickly declared Texas a major disaster area, sending generators, fuel, water, and other supplies and making federal grants and loans available to victims.

The misery and damage could have been avoided if Texas officials had put community safety ahead of corporate profit and a failed philosophy of minimal government. The disaster's cost will far exceed the cost of preparing for it.

Training for offensive positions are quarterback, wide receiver, running back; defensive positions - cornerback, safety and linebacker. Fee for one position (offense or defense) \$25 per week or \$75 per month; fee for two positions (offense or defense) \$40 per week or \$90 per month. The sessions will be held at Swartz Field, 5142 Swartz Road, Kansas City, Ks 66106. You can register for these sessions and/or get more information by going to Turner Recreation's Facebook page.

SENATE NEWS

We are officially one month into session. The Senate met on Tuesday and Thursday to take action on 12 bills and four appointments. All of them passed on Emergency Final Action.

SB 22 - as Senator Ethan Corson so bluntly put it - is a bullet train to Brownbackville. Senate Democrats fought to make this bill work for Kansas families and businesses by leveling the playing field and holding out-of-state businesses to the same standard as businesses right here at home. With the revenues generated by our proposal, we could have paid for a modest increase in the standard deduction. Instead, Senate Republicans rejected these revenues and accepted the tax relief without any way to pay for it. And they kept tax credits for giant multinational corporations, 62% of which have no income in Kansas.

While our state is recovering from the economic consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic, SB 22 would cut our state budget by over \$1 billion over three years. Our state has a constitutional duty to adequately fund our public schools and an obligation to Kansas taxpayers to keep our roads and bridges safe. SB 22 jeopardizes our ability to fulfill those responsibilities, and I voted NO.

In another hit to our schools, the Senate passed SB 61, which expanded a tax credit for scholarships to private schools. The original intent of this program was to help low-income children attending struggling public elementary schools; this bill expanded the definition of qualifying children and expanded the program to all schools.

Cindy Holscher and I brought amendments to keep this program targeted toward students in struggling schools, and to ensure that these qualifying, private schools are held to the same accreditation, reporting, and non-discrimination standards as our public schools. These efforts were rejected along party lines.

All Kansas children have a right to high-quality public education. Redirecting public dollars to private schools creates an unlevel playing field for public education students, which is why I voted NO. Our constitutional responsibility is to fund public schools.

This week marked the last week for bill introductions. With a few exceptions, as of Monday, no more bills can be introduced for the 2020 session. The deadline for bills to pass out of their house of origin, also known as turnaround day, is March 5th.

Unemployment Updates

On Monday, the Kansas Department of Labor announced that the agency's new identity verification software system has blocked over one million fraudulent login attempts and attacks since it went live at the beginning of February.

A fraudulent login is a criminal trying to access the KDOL software system to file

a fraudulent claim. A BOT attack is the use of automated web requests to manipulate or disrupt a website, application or end-users online. Originally, these attacks were simple spam operations, but over time have become more sophisticated criminal enterprises. Stopping these BOT attacks reduces the strain on the KDOL unemployment insurance IT system, enabling the agency to more effectively analyze and service valid benefit claims.

If you haven't already, you will need to sign up for a new benefits account. Once you've set up your new account, you will be required to use multi-factor authentication each time you log in. You can learn more here.

The department also announced that the extension of the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) program from 39 weeks to 50 weeks is now available. To file for the additional weeks, claimants should log into their unemployment benefits claim portal. For details and to determine whether you are eligible for PUA benefits, read the full statement from KDOL here. The PUA program expires on March 14, 2021. This means that the last payable week for PUA is the week ending March 13, 2021. However, if you receive a PUA payment for the week ending March 13, 2021, and have remaining entitlement on your claim, you may be eligible to participate in a phase-out period and you may continue to collect PUA through the week ending April 10, 2021.

Since March 15, 2020, KDOL has paid out over 3.9 million weekly claims totaling over \$2.6 billion between regular unemployment and the federal pandemic programs. For more information, or to apply for unemployment benefits, go to www.GetKansasBenefits.gov.

COVID-19 VACCINE UP-DATES

Over the past few weeks, we have seen a steady and pretty significant decrease in the number of new cases – and that is good news. While we can be reassured by these numbers, we cannot allow them to lure us into a false sense of security. Please continue wearing masks, getting tested, physically distancing, and avoiding large gatherings.

Despite the ongoing nationwide vaccine shortage, Kansas is making progress getting vaccines into arms. As of today, the Kansas Vaccine Dashboard shows that 273,428 Kansans are reported

as vaccinated — over 9% of our population. You can find our COVID-19 vaccine dashboard here. It is updated every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday by 12:30pm. Below is Kansas's vaccine phase plan by population. We are currently in Phase 2.

Recently, Governor Kelly's administration rolled out the Find My Vaccine Tool. The mapping tool is designed to help Kansans locate sites that are administering vaccines in their communities. The tool is available now on https://kansasvaccine.gov, Kansas's COVID-19 vaccine website. Kansans in vaccine phase 1 and 2 are recommended to use this tool as a resource for finding providers who are or will be offering the vaccine.

The Federal Retail Pharmacy Program begins this week, with the Federal Government sending vaccines directly to enrolled pharmacies. In Kansas, there are 12 pharmacy chains with more than 400 locations enrolled. This week, there are 82 pharmacies over 32 counties who will be given vaccine from the federal government. The allocation to Kansas pharmacies participating in the program is 8.700 doses this week. These locations are tasked with vaccinating those ages 65+.

1st Judicial District Appointment

Governor Laura Kelly appointed John J. Bryant, Jr., Kansas City, Kansas, to the 1st Judicial District vacancy created by the retirement of Judge Robert Bednar. "John brings an impressive mix of experience to the bench and has served the people of Atchison and Leavenworth counties well as an attorney," Governor Kelly said. "I know that he will do the same as a judge.

District court judges in the 1st Judicial District are appointed by the governor and selected from nominees chosen by a district nominating commission. Judges in nominating commission districts are subject to retention elections every four years.

KCK School District Moving to In-Person

The KCKPS Board of Education approved the administration's recommendation to begin allowing students to return to in-person instruction beginning February 22nd.

The District's reentry plan is being completed in phases. The first phase allows for a select group of students in grades K-5 who are having connectivity issues to return to school campuses for the remainder of the school year.

In addition, a select group of high school seniors will also be allowed to return to their school campus to ensure they receive the appropriate amount of credit hours to graduate.

The next phase of the plan approved during the regular board meeting on Tuesday allows for the return of a select group of middle school students beginning March 1st. The final phase of the reentry plan allows all students an option to receive in-person instruction beginning April 5th.

U.S. Capitol Attack, 'More Demented Than Previously Reported'
