

Governor Laura Kelly Announces Executive Order Delaying School Openings Until After Labor Day Will also issue order enforcing health guidelines, mitigation strategies in schools

TOPEKA – Governor Laura Kelly today announced that on Monday, she will sign an executive order to delay opening schools until after the Labor Day holiday.

“I can’t in good conscience open schools when cases in our state are at an all-time high and continuing to rapidly rise,” Governor Kelly said. “Every action I have taken throughout this pandemic has been done to keep Kansans healthy, keep our state open for business and get our kids back in school.”

The Governor made this decision in consultation with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment and the Kansas Department of Education, which continue to monitor health metrics and disease spread in the state.

On Monday, a record coronavirus spike pushed Kansas past 20,000 total cases. ICU capacity in some of the state’s hospitals are under threat, and nearly 300 Kansans have died.

The Governor will also issue an executive order requiring schools to mandate commonsense mitigation strategies outlined in the Kansas Board of Education’s fall plan for schools. Under the order, masks, social distancing, proper hygiene, and daily temperature checks will be enforced regardless of the Kansas school district.

“The additional three weeks before opening schools will provide schools time to work with their counties to get the necessary mitigation supplies like masks, thermometers, and hand sanitizer,” Governor Kelly said. “The Kansas State Board of Education and I are united in prioritizing the health of our students and faculty, and ensuring we provide a world-class education for our students.”

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Mask Order Amended Further in Wyandotte County

Masks required for indoor exercise and sports; required for children over age five in childcare settings

- Athletes who are engaged in indoor activities and those exercising indoors are hereby required to wear masks or face coverings. This includes both team sports activities and in gym/weightlifting settings.

- Solitary outdoor exercise remains exempt from the face covering requirement.

- All children over 5 years of age and all staff in day-care/childcare/educational settings are required to wear masks or face coverings at all times unless actively eating, drinking, or sleeping. Medical exemptions from LHO 7/6/20 remain in effect.

A new Local Health Officer (LHO) Order was issued today with additional amendments to the mask wearing requirements for Wyandotte County. The Order is set to go into effect at 12:01 AM on Wednesday, July 15.

The new amendments are:

“We’ve gotten many questions about the mask order, especially as it relates to exercise and sports. Socially distanced outdoor exercise is relatively safe, but we are really concerned about the potential for spread of the virus that causes COVID-19 with indoor exercise, whether it is people working out at a gym or participating in team sports,” said Dr. Erin Corriveau, Deputy Medical Officer with the Unified Government Public Health Department (UGPHD). “Wearing a mask while exercising indoors may be a bit uncomfortable, and it takes some getting used to, but there’s no scientific evidence to indicate that it is harmful to wear a mask during exercise.”

“Another concern was about childcare settings. We feel it is incredibly important for face coverings to be worn in these settings for the protection of the children, staff, and their families,” said Dr. Allen Greiner, Chief Medical Officer with the UGPHD. “We realize this is an adjustment for families and childcare providers, but it’s the best way to minimize the risk of the coronavirus spreading in settings like this.”

Masks are required locally for children over age five, but the CDC actually recommends masks for anyone age two or older. Children under age two should never wear masks as it is a safety hazard at that age.

These new amendments follow an LHO Order that was issued on July 6 adopting Governor Kelly’s Executive Order 20-52 requiring masks for the state, with one amendment for Wyandotte County. This previous amendment remains in effect:

- The term “Public Space” includes public and private offices where more than one individual is congregating, workspaces where more than one individual is present, and any area of the office complex where more than one individual is present, such as a kitchen or break room.

Certain exceptions to the mask requirement for health, safety, and accessibility remain in effect, such as:

- People age five years or under – children age two years and under in particular should not wear a face covering because of the risk of suffocation

- People with a medical condition, mental health condition, or disability that prevents wearing a face covering

- People who are deaf or hard of hearing, or communicating with a person who is deaf or hard of hearing, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication

She has now joined in heaven her Grandpa, Jason Purvis; and Uncle, Bruce Saindon.

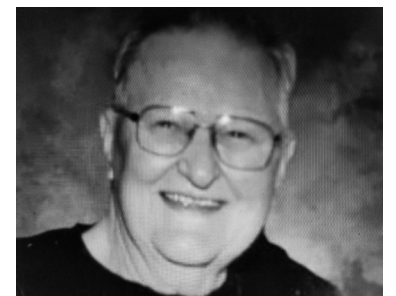
A visitation took place at 10:00 AM, followed by a graveside service at 11:00 AM on Friday, July 17, 2020 at the Maple Hill Cemetery.

when they are 1/2 green and 1/2 red to prevent sunscald and to allow the development of a deeper red color during hot weather.

The fruit will have the same quality as if it were vine ripened if allowed to ripen inside.

“Tomatoes may have a problem with cracking caused by the pressure inside the fruit that is more than the skin can handle. Cracks are usually on the upper part of the fruit in concentric circles around the stem or radiating downward from the stem.

Tomatoes have a root system that is very dense and fibrous and quite efficient in picking up water. Unfortunately, the root system can become unbalanced with the top of the plant. Early in the season it may be small in relation to the top growth resulting in blossom-end rot when the weather turns hot and dry. Later it may be so efficient that it provides too much water when it rains, or we irrigate too heavily after a dry spell. The quick influx of water can cause the tomato to crack. Therefore, even consistent water can help with cracking. Mulching will also help because it moderates moisture levels in the soil.” Sometimes no matter what you do you may still have problems with cracking.

Of the older varieties Jet Star seem to be the most re-

sistant. Newer varieties with more controlled growth are Mountain Spring, Mountain Pride, Mountain Fresh, Florina, and Sun Leaper.

Be on the lookout for the Green June Beetle. They are large beetles that feed on sweet corn, blackberries, and peaches. They look like the May beetle or June bug but have a dull velvety green color and the underside is more of an iridescent green. They have poor navigational skills and seem to fly until they hit something. They also make a buzzing sound like a bumble bee and are about the same size as one. This is a cause for concern for gardeners even though they cannot harm people, they may damage crops. Several general use insecticides such as Ortho Flower, Fruit & Vegetable Killer, Sevin, may be used to discourage feeding. If you choose an insecticide be sure to read the instructions and pay special attention to the waiting period between spraying and harvesting. We had a swarm in the orchard this past week and took quick action.

IRS Gives Tips on Filing, Paying Electronically and Checking Refunds Online; 2019 Tax Returns and Payments Due July 15

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today reminded taxpayers with a filing requirement to file an accurate tax return on time even if a balance due can't be paid in full. The deadline to submit 2019 tax returns is July 15, 2020, for most people. Members of the military serving overseas may have more time.

File electronically to avoid most common errors

Filing electronically and choosing direct deposit remains the fastest and safest way to file an accurate income tax return and receive a refund. Filing electronically reduces tax return errors as the tax software does the calculations, flags common errors and prompts taxpayers for missing information.

An inaccurate tax return can delay a refund.

Some common errors to avoid include:

- Missing or inaccurate Social Security numbers. Enter each name and SSN exactly as printed on the Social Security card.
- Incorrect filing status. The Interactive Tax Assistant on IRS.gov can help taxpayers choose the correct status. Tax software also helps prevent these mistakes.
- Math errors. Tax preparation software does all the math automatically. Math errors are common on paper returns.
- Figuring credits or deductions incorrectly. Taxpayers should follow the instructions carefully, and double check the information they enter when filing electronically. The IRS Interactive Tax Assistant can help determine if a taxpayer is eligible for certain tax credits.
- Unsigned returns. Both spouses must sign if filing jointly. Taxpayers can avoid this error by filing their return electronically and digitally signing it. Exceptions may apply for military families if a spouse is serving overseas.
- Filing with an expired individual taxpayer identification number.

In most cases, tax software helps to reduce or eliminate these. Find complete details on all the benefits of filing electronically, including IRS Free File, commercial tax prep software or an authorized e-File provider from the “File” page on IRS.gov.

Checking on refunds

The IRS is processing electronic and paper tax returns and issuing refunds. The IRS normally issues most refunds in less than 21 days. Taxpayers who mailed a tax return will experience a longer wait time. There is no need to mail a second tax return or call the IRS. “Where’s My Refund?” on IRS.gov is the most convenient way to check the status of a refund. It has a tracker that displays progress through three phases: (1) Return Received; (2) Refund Approved; and (3) Refund Sent.

All that is needed to use “Where’s My Refund?” is the taxpayer’s Social Security number, tax filing status (such as single, married, head of household) and exact amount of the tax refund claimed on the 2019 tax return. It is updated no more than once every 24 hours, usually overnight, so there’s no need to check the status more often.

Taxpayers should file now, schedule full or partial tax payments up to the July 15 due date

Taxpayers can pay online, by phone or with their mobile device and the IRS2Go app. When paying federal taxes electronically taxpayers should remember:

- Electronic payment options are the optimal way to make a tax payment.
- They can pay when they file electronically using tax software online. If using a tax preparer, taxpayers should ask the preparer to make the tax payment through an electronic funds withdrawal from a bank account.
- IRS Direct Pay allows taxpayers to pay online directly from a checking or savings account for free.
- Taxpayers can choose to pay with a credit card, debit card or digital wallet option through a payment processor. The processor may charge a fee. No fees go to the IRS.
- The IRS2Go app provides the mobile-friendly payment options, including Direct Pay and payment processor payments on mobile devices.
- Taxpayers may also enroll in the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System and have a choice of paying online or by phone by using the EFTPS Voice Response System.

Can't pay a tax bill?

Everyone should file their 2019 tax return by the July 15 tax filing deadline regardless of whether or not they can pay in full. Taxpayers who owe and can't pay all taxes due have options including:

- Online Payment Agreement — Most individual taxpayers and many business taxpayers may qualify to use Online Payment Agreement to set up a payment plan. Taxpayers can setup a plan on IRS.gov/paymentplan in a matter of minutes. Setup fees may apply for some types of plans.
- Delaying Collection — If the IRS determines a taxpayer is unable to pay, it may delay collection until the taxpayer’s financial condition improves. In light of COVID-19, IRS postponed many compliance efforts until July 15 or later under the People First Initiative.
- Offer in Compromise (OIC) — Taxpayers who qualify enter into an agreement with the IRS that settles their tax liability for less than the full amount owed.

Need an extension of time to file a 2019 tax return?

Those who need more time to prepare their 2019 federal tax return can apply for an extension of time to file. An extension of time to file does not grant an extension of time to pay taxes owed. File an extension request, estimate and pay any owed taxes by the July 15 deadline to avoid possible penalties.
