

KCKFD and Vibrant Health Launch Innovative Program

Addressing Root Causes of Health Disparities in Wyandotte County

Kansas City, KS- Kansas City Kansas Fire Department (KCKFD) and Vibrant Health have partnered to launch WYCO Care Connection (WCC). WYCO Care Connection is a community paramedicine program, which seeks to reduce the number of individuals using emergency medical services for non-emergent care. One of the main goals of this collaborative partnership is to bring high-quality clinical and support services to the homes of some of Wyandotte County's most vulnerable residents.

Program Details

WYCO Care Connection is an 18-month pilot program, the first of its kind in the Wyandotte County area, which connects residents who frequently visit local emergency rooms with essential services to keep them safe and healthy and prevent unnecessary trips to the emergency room. The core services include point of care testing, medical and lab services, as well as in-depth patient assessment services.

This innovative community paramedicine model consists of a mobile team including a



nurse practitioner and paramedic who visit the homes of individuals who frequently call 911 or visit local emergency rooms for non-emergency needs. By reducing the number of unnecessary ER visits, it reduces the strain on the health system while also improving outcomes from the patients being served.

"We know that only a fraction of an individual's health is determined by what happens inside of a clinic or doctor's office. The majority of outcomes are based on external factors like access to food

or transportation," said WCC Nurse Practitioner Erika Ortiz. "This program is helping us break down that barrier by meeting these patients where they are, advocating for their needs and connecting them with appropriate community-based services."

Since the mid-October launch of the WYCO Care Connections program over 30 patients have been seen. Many of the patients require extensive follow-up as well as case management work. This



A New Eye in the Sky:

The James Webb Space Telescope

The eye of Man is about to go where no eye has gone before. If the scheduled December 22 launch (6:10 am CST) goes well, the innovative James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) will journey 29 days to a point 1.5 million kilometers (930,000 miles) away, far beyond the moon's orbit, known as a Lagrange point where the



gravitational forces of the Sun, Earth, and moon balance each other out. The telescope can remain in a stable orbit around the Sun and be free of atmospheric and heat distortions. It's also too far away to be visited for repairs.

Named for James Webb, NASA chief during the Apollo era of the 1960s, the telescope is the result of more than 20 years of designing, constructing, and testing by scientists and engineers from 14 countries led by the U.S., the E.U., and Canada. The JWST left California by ship in September and passed through the Panama Canal on its way to the European Space Agency's launch facility in French Guiana on the Atlantic coast of South America. There it was loaded into a reliable European Ariane 5 rocket that will carry it into space then release it for the trip to the distant Lagrange point.

A hundred times more powerful than the 30-year-old Hubble, the JWST has two main purposes: to see farther, and therefore further back in time, to the universe as it was 13.5 billion years ago, a quarter billion years after the big bang when the first stars and galaxies were forming; and to study potentially habitable exoplanets—planets outside our solar system. Since the first was discovered in 1996, more than 4,000 exoplanets have been found; the JWST will use spectroscopy to analyze their infrared spectrums to determine what their atmospheres contain, including oxygen and water.

The JWST is a spectacular feat of engineering. After release from its rocket, five sheets of silvery foil, thinner than ordinary paper and nearly the size of a tennis court, will unroll to protect the telescope from the heat of the Sun and Earth that would overwhelm vital infrared data. Soon after, 18 gold-coated hexagonal mirrors will unfold like a flower blooming in space to form a single mirror as tall and wide as a two-story house. The 6.5 m (21 ft) mirror has an area six times as large as Hubble's to collect the ancient light from the early universe.

Why invest more than two decades of work and nine billion dollars in the cause of seeing the early universe and studying exoplanets? The easy answer is that space investments have given us countless useful technologies from Teflon to microelectronics to GPS to satellite communications. But that isn't the important answer. That answer, according to astronomer Bart Bok, related in *The New Yorker* by one of his students, is that it is worthwhile in the way that art is worthwhile. It is "what distinguishes us as human." It's more than curiosity; it's the human drive to know.

The farthest thing we can see with the naked eye is the Andromeda Galaxy, but because of the speed of light, we see it as it was 2.5 million years ago when the Isthmus of Panama was still forming on Earth. We see the moon as it was 1.4 minutes ago. The universe is a history book, and the JWST should allow us to read all but the first chapter. If all goes well, we may soon be able to read The Beginning.

You Can Still Apply For Medicare Online

Did you know that you can apply for Medicare online even if you are not ready to retire? And it takes less than 10 minutes! There are no forms to sign and usually no required documentation. We'll process your application and contact you if we need more information. To apply for Medicare and find other important information, visit www.ssa.gov/benefits/medicare.

If you want to start receiving Medicare at age 65, you must apply for Medicare no earlier than three months before your 65th birthday and no later than three months after that birthday. We refer to this six-month window of opportunity to apply for Medicare as your initial enrollment period.

Some Medicare beneficiaries may qualify for Extra Help to pay for the monthly premiums, annual deductibles, and co-payments related to the Medicare Prescription Drug program. You must be receiving Medicare, have limited resources and income, and reside in one of the 50 states or the District of Columbia to qualify for the Extra Help. 

Mark Meadows to Face Contempt of Congress Charges

Meadows had served as chief of staff for the former president. He had announced that he would appear before the Select Committee, then, on the following week, backed out and no longer wishes to make his appearance. A tactic that some say is a way of dragging out the proceedings.

In addition to backing out, Meadows is now suing the Committee and its members instead.

House Select Committee chair, Bennie Thompson released a letter in response: "If, indeed Mr. Meadows refuses to appear, the Select Committee will be left no choice but to advance contempt proceedings and recommend that the body Mr. Meadows once served, refer him for Criminal prosecution.

Meadows had already provided documents and other materials to the Select Committee. These detail just how deeply involved and the efforts he made to have the results of the election overturned.

Chairman Thompson states, "Despite very broad claims of Executive Privilege, Mark Meadows has also provided documents you apparently agree are relevant and not protected by any privilege at all."

"Those documents include: A November 7, 2020, email in which you discuss the appointment of alternative slates of electors as a part of a "Direct and collateral attack" just days after the election."

"In another email from January 5, 2021 there is reference to a 38-page Power Point briefing titled, "Election Fraud, Foreign Interference and Options for January 6 that was to be provided, "On the hill"; and among others, a January 5, 2021 email about having the National Guard on standby."

Chairman Thompson's letter goes on and he points out that only 3 days after the election, "The text messages that Mr. Meadows produced include a November 6, 2020, text exchange with a Member of Congress, apparently about appointing alternate electors in certain states as part of a plan that the member acknowledged would be "highly controversial" and to which Mr. Meadows said, "I love it!"

Meadows was involved in other efforts to overturn the election results. Meadows tried to have the Department of Justice investigate false claims of election fraud. He also made similar requests of several State officials to investigate allegations of election fraud.

"Emails show the increasingly urgent efforts by president Trump and his allies during the last days in office to find some way to undermine or even nullify, the election results." Source of last quote, The New York Times.

By defying the House subpoena, Mark Meadows becomes the latest in a string of former administration officials and campaign advisers refusing to cooperate with the House Select Committee's probe into January 6.

Chairman Thompson together with Rep. Liz Cheney issued a joint statement that in addition to contempt charges, they would reveal the wide range of matters the Committee seeks to discuss with him, should he continue to defy the subpoena.

They also pointed to the more than 150 people who have cooperated with the investigation.

"It's unfortunate that Mr. Meadows has chosen to join a very small group of witnesses who believe they are above the law and are defying a Select Committee subpoena outright," remarked Thompson and Cheney in their joint statement.

Chaos, delay, possible obstruction and other such tactics are not the acts of people who have not committed a crime and they all seem to make themselves appear to be guilty by refusing to cooperate. Source USA Today.

It's big red bow season: Time for tips to avoid car sale scams

It's December and holiday traditions are in full swing. As big red bow commercials continue to signal the green light to shop, customers searching for the perfect car deal should approach each potential sale with a cautious yellow light mentality. Knowing how to spot unscrupulous sales tactics can help potential car buyers see the red light and hit the brakes before a car sale turns fraudulent. Here are a few tips for avoiding used auto scams:

1) "Must sell now" – Whether a deeply discounted car is due to the seller claiming a pending military deployment, or is in the middle of a divorce, must-sell-now scammers will often request partial payment upfront as a condition to receiving the "good deal" on a car. Walk away if a high-pressure seller demands an upfront payment.

2) Too good to be true – If a car price seems too good to be true, it probably is. It is good practice to approach each sale knowing the car's real value by checking valuation tools at sites like Edmunds or Kelly Blue Book. If the car sales price is significantly lower than the listed valuation price, be suspicious.

3) "Just needs"—Designed to lower a car buyer's guard, this approach appears to be open and honest by admitting to a minor inexpensive flaw. However, the seller may be actually trying to disguise expensive flaws by hoping their "honesty" leads to a vehicle inspection in which the buyer never examines beyond the seller's provided "just needs" recommendations.

4) Paying with gift cards – If a car seller ever requests you make a payment using gift cards, run faster than the gingerbread man. This kind of payment is nearly untraceable and is an ideal form of payment for scammers. The same can be said for requested payments via wire transfer. Most payments towards the purchase of an automobile are best executed via credit card or check.

Along with utilizing sites like Edmunds and Kelly Blue Book, car shoppers should always search the vehicle identification number (VIN) of any potential car purchase.
