Mother shares tragic story about loss to help put the brakes on fatalities

Two seconds of being unbuckled was all it took. In that time, 16-year-old Miranda Dunsworth lost control of the vehicle, which then flipped, broke her neck, threw her from the car and then landed on her. She died on June 21, 2012.

One of the two people who went to her parents' house to make the notification was Finney County Warrants Deputy Sam Darroch. Darroch has been a law enforcement officer for 23 years now, but still remembers the crash. He was the one who responded to the 911 call, and he was the first one on the scene.

It was such a tragedy, "but the thing that bothered me the most was at the time, I had a young teenage girl, and she would be driving within the next year or two," Darroch said.

It was a somber reminder that, "driving while trying to divide your attention could result in deadly consequences if you fail," he said.

The loss to her parents, other family members and friends was indescribable. "Miranda's passing was the worst thing that could have ever happened to my husband and I," said Miranda's mother, Angie Landon Dunsworth. "Miranda's funeral and images in my head of my baby lying on a cold slab, something that no parent should ever have to bear."

While it's difficult to think about, Angie is sharing her story as part of the annual Put the Brakes on Fatalities Day traffic safety blog series where eight other Kansans are also sharing personal stories. The series wraps up today, Oct. 10, which is Put the Brakes on Fatalities Day. Angie hopes by explaining what happened that others learn to always make traffic safety the priority when behind the wheel.

"If I can help just one person, it's worth it," Angie said.

Put the Brakes on Fatalities Day is a national safety campaign that started in Kansas in 2001. Whether you are in a vehicle, on a motorcycle or bicycle or even walking, the goal is for you to arrive safely.

Earlier this year, I shared with Kansans that I had been diagnosed with breast cancer. I also shared that I expected to make a full recovery. Following surgery and several radiation treatments, I am thrilled to share that I am now cancer free. However, I must say I do not think I will ever fully recover from this experience. I think that is why they call them cancer survivors.

Sharing the news, I had cancer, was an experience in and of itself. Cancer is a difficult personal expe-

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2024 Medicare Open Enrollment Begins October 15th

TOPEKA – More than 572,000 Kansas residents receive health coverage through Medicare, and the time to review benefits is only days away. The program's Fall Open Enrollment period, when you can make changes that take effect January 1 of the following year, occurs each year from October 15 through December 7.

"It's important that Medicare beneficiaries make sure their current providers are still participating in their plan for 2024 and that the cost of any medications they need hasn't increased," KDADS Director of Medicare Programs Emily Blanch said. "Medicare beneficiaries can make changes to several aspects of their coverage, so it's important to look at all the options again before you lock yourself in for another year. We encourage people

to always take advantage of open enrollment because all of us have health care needs that change over time and Medicare plans change as well."

By shopping available plans and comparing costs, beneficiaries may be able to find a Medicare health or drug plan with better coverage or a lower premium in 2024. Help is out there:

- The Medicare Plan Finder, an online tool that helps people compare pricing between Original Medicare, Medicare prescription drug plans, Medicare Advantage plans, and Medicare Supplement Insurance (Medigap) policies, will be updated with 2024 information by October 1, 2023.
- 1-800-MEDICARE is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to provide help in English and

Spanish as well as more than 200 additional languages.

• Senior Health Insurance Counseling for Kansas is a free program that offers Kansans unbiased assistance with questions about Medicare and other insurance issues. SHICK has counselors throughout the state to educate and assist the public in making informed decisions for each individual situation. This counseling services is free at 1-800-860-5260.

During open enrollment, those currently enrolled may:

- Switch from original Medicare to a Medicare Advantage plan, or vice versa
- Switch from one Medicare Advantage plan to another, or from one Medicare Part D prescription drug plan to another
 - If you didn't enroll in a Medi-


care Part D plan when you were first eligible, you can do so during open enrollment, although a late enrollment penalty may apply

If you want to enroll in a Medicare Advantage plan, you must meet some basic criteria:

- You must be enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B
- You must live in the plan's service area

If you're already enrolled in a Medicare Part D prescription plan or a Medicare Advantage Plan and you don't want to make changes to your coverage for 2024, you don't need to do anything during open enrollment, assuming your current plan will still be available in 2024. If your plan is being discontinued and isn't eligible for renewal, you

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Governor Kelly Announces Juneteenth to be Observed as a State Holiday Kansas Joins 28 Other States Including Texas, Missouri, and Nebraska

TOPEKA –Governor Laura Kelly announced that Kansas will designate Juneteenth as a state holiday, joining 28 other states and the District of Columbia.

"Juneteenth marks a significant point our nation's history and has long been celebrated in Kansas and across the United States," Governor Laura Kelly said. "Establishing Juneteenth as a state holiday provides Kansans an opportunity to celebrate our state's diversity and honor the ongoing struggles for racial equality."

Juneteenth commemorates June 19, 1865, the day the last enslaved Americans received word that President Abraham Lincoln had signed the Emancipation Proclamation to abolish slavery more than 2 years after the end of the

Civil War. Governor Kelly has issued proclamations recognizing Juneteenth every year since 2020.

"I am thrilled that Juneteenth will be a state holiday," said Stacey Knoell, Executive Director of the Kansas African American Affairs Commission. "This day is a perfect example of the importance of learning the full picture of history, not to cast blame but to find reasons for acknowledging resilience. I hope

this day can become one where Kansans can unite in celebration."

In 2021, Juneteenth became the first federal holiday created in more than 40 years. Since then, Kansas' neighboring states of Nebraska, Missouri, and Colorado have also established Juneteenth as a state holiday. The holiday will apply to Executive Branch employees under Governor Kelly's jurisdiction.

will receive a non-renewal notice from your carrier prior to open enrollment.

Each year, there's a Medicare Advantage Open Enrollment Period from January 1 through March 31. During this time, if you're in a Medicare Advantage plan and want to change your health plan, you can switch to a different Medicare Advantage Plan with or without drug coverage or go back to original Medicare and, if needed, also join a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan.

Changes to be aware of for 2024 include:

- 21 Medicare prescription drug plans will be available with premiums varying from \$0.50 to \$106.70
- 77.81 percent of people with a stand-alone Medicare prescription drug plan have access to a plan with a lower premium than what they paid in 2023
- 92 Medicare Advantage plans are available in 2024, compared to 90 plans in 2023
- 100 percent of people with Medicare have access to a Medicare Advantage plan
- The average monthly Medicare Advantage plan premium changed from \$7.42 in 2023 to \$9.90 in 2024, representing a \$2.48 change in average premium
- Through the Inflation Reduction Act, people with Medicare prescription drug coverage who fall into the catastrophic phase of the prescription drug benefit won't have to pay anything out of pocket

during that phase for covered Medicare prescription drugs

• There will be expanded eligibility for full benefits under the Extra Help program, meaning all Extra Help enrollees will pay no deductible, no premium, and benefit from fixed lower copayments for certain medications. Learn more about the Extra Help program, including eligibility criteria and how to apply

To help with Medicare costs, low-income seniors and adults with disabilities may qualify to receive financial assistance from a Medicare Savings Programs (MSPs). MSPs help millions of Americans access high-quality health care at a reduced cost, yet only about half of eligible people are enrolled. MSPs cover Medicare premiums and may also cover Medicare deductibles, coinsurance, and copayments if individuals meet the eligibility requirements in their state. Enrolling in an MSP offers relief from these Medicare costs, allowing people to spend money on other necessities like food, housing, or transportation.

The Low-Income Subsidy Program, also called Extra Help, is a Medicare program that helps qualifying individuals pay Part D premiums, deductibles, coinsurance, and other costs. Enrollees can save nearly \$300 per year on average according to estimates. Up to three million seniors and people with disabilities could benefit from the Extra Help program but aren't currently enrolled. Individuals who enroll in MSPs automatically qualify for help affording prescription drugs through the Extra Help program.

I would, once again, like to thank the University of Kansas Cancer Center for the world-class care I received. We are blessed to have such a wonderful facility here at home.

No one can accurately prepare you for a battle with cancer, though I was inspired by the stories people would share with me about their own battles. Kansans have long served as my extended family and during my battle they lived up to the kind, compassionate and supportive nature we are known for in the Midwest. I have never felt more loved. I have never been prouder to

be a Kansan. And I have never been more thankful to have my husband, Mike, by my side.

This journey has taught me a lot about the fight it takes it takes to navigate a serious health situation, the compassion needed to guide people through it and the headaches insurance can sometimes add to an already difficult situation.

I know I cannot fix everything, but as an elected official, it is my job to help in every way I can.
