Holiday Gift Book Ideas



ive the gift of reading. Books inform and entertain, are conveniently portable and affordable, and, with a little care, last indefinitely. And books are easy to wrap. Here are suggestions in popular categories. All are also available as eBooks.

Politics. Profiles in Ignorance: How America's Politicians Got Dumb and Dumber, by Andy Borowitz (Avid Reader Press, 2022). Borowitz is a popular humorist, so this book has its share of laughs to balance the depressingly dumb things that many recent presidents, senators, candidates, and others of both parties have said and believed. Full of frightening facts and quotes from often incompetent leaders, Borowitz sees three stages of ignorance—ridicule, acceptance, celebration—and writes, "Over the past fifty years, what some of our most prominent politicians didn't know could fill a book. This is that book."

Jobs. Uncommon Carriers, by John McPhee (Farrar, Straus and Giroux; 2006). Tales of the people and machines that move freight, witnessed by McPhee as he rode coast to coast in an eighteen-wheeler, rode in locomotive cabs of coal trains from Wyoming to Kansas, attended a school for captains of tankers and other heavy ships where they practiced by handling realistic 16-ton models on a Swiss lake (\$15,000 a week tuition), explored the sorting process at UPS Air's Louisville hub, and other adventures. It's work that few of us ever see up close, but that all of us depend upon. McPhee is a wonderful writer—literally. Nearly every page reveals a wonder that we usually take for granted.

Historical Fiction. *The Last Kingdom* by Bernard Cornwell (Harper, 2005) is a *New York Times* bestseller. *Game of Thrones* fans will find similar court intrigues, heroes and



villains, and to-the-death battles in a medieval setting. The difference is that Cornwell's story is based on real events in ninth-century Britain when King Alfred of Wessex defeated, barely, the Great Heathen Army of Viking invaders and laid the foundation of a unified England. The story centers on a warrior, Uhtred, who was born to a powerful Saxon family but was captured when a boy by a Viking warlord who raised him as a son, teaching him swordcraft and how to survive in a dangerous time. Ironically, Uhtred went on to fight for Alfred and the English cause. Be warned: this and the following 12 books in the series describe in gory detail the horrible violence that was a feature of medieval war. While all major events are documented history, each book concludes with an explanation of which parts are fiction needed to provide a coherent story.

Banned Books. Any book that someone wants banned likely has an important point. George Orwell's classic *1984* is the frightening story published in 1949 of a society

where facts are manipulated by a repressive government through a personality cult revering Big Brother. Freedom is smothered by fear. An opposing classic, equally frightening, is Aldous Huxley's *Brave New World* where people are laboratory-bred for their roles in life and coerced to accept their fates through pleasure, not fear, by using drugs and state-sponsored entertainment. Years are numbered A.F.—"After Ford"—in a technology-driven society. In Ray Bradbury's 1953 *Fahrenheit 451*, books are outlawed in the U.S. and burned by "firemen" who search for and seize them. The title refers to the temperature at which books ignite.

Memoir. In *My Name Is Barbra* (Penguin, 2023), Barbra Streisand tells the story of her life, loves, and career. Gifted with a clear and powerful singing voice, she graduated high school at 16 and within a decade was a major recording artist and movie star. Her book, like her voice, is quirky, entrancing, and clear. It's also 992 pages long. She's worth it.

and learned a lot about how the Sheriff's Office serves our community.

During the 1930's, a lending library program in rural America began under the auspices of the WPA. "The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek" by Kim Michele Richardson tells the story of one such young woman who rode her donkey into the hills of Kentucky. But she was different, she had inherited a gene that made her skin look blue. (Her body did not oxygenate, and her blood was a dark red which in turn caused the blue color.) For this reason, she was discriminated against. The story illustrated the lengths the book women went through in delivering the books, the harsh conditions that they and others suffered, the poverty, and the deaths- some from starvation, childbirth, black lung disease. The story of the girl's condition is based on fact. There is a family that lives in Kentucky that suffers from this ailment. In the sixties a remedy was found to temporarily change the skin color but there were side effects.

If you get a chance to see the movie "The Killers of the Flower Moon" do so. If not, read the book by David Grann. I read it several years ago and found it informative but disturbing. The Osage Indians forced to locate to the poorest land surface in Oklahoma found oil on the property. Soon they were taken advantage of by a group of white men who wanted their money and would do anything including murder to get it. This is a story of GREED. As for the definition of flower moon, during May in the Oklahoma hills, blooming flowers die when taller plants crowd them out, so the Osage refer to that month as the time of flower-moon.

Attorney General Kris Kobach will be asking the Kansas Court of Appeals to reverse a district court judge's temporary injunction blocking important informed consent provisions of the Woman's Right to Know Act.

"We commend the Attorney General for standing against this unprecedented attack on a woman's right to information and her freedom from being pressured into an abortion," said Danielle Underwood, Communications Director of Kansans for Life. "The abortion industry's profits are not more important than a woman's informed consent."

Kelly and Parson Participate in Disagree Better Initiative

TOPEKA — Governor Laura Kelly joined Missouri Governor Mike Parson to announce their participation in the National Governors Association's (NGA) Disagree Better initiative. Both Governors recently sat down at Q39 Midtown for some Kansas City BBQ to discuss areas of common ground as well as how to disagree better.

"Getting things done doesn't just require working across state lines — it also requires working across party lines. That's how Governor Parson and I have together grown the economy of the entire Kansas City region," Governor Laura Kelly said. "We've joined the Disagree Better initiative because we both agree — now is the time to turn down the volume on our national political conversation. Finding productive ways to overcome

differences is the only way we can make progress as two states and as a country."

"It's important to us to work together with our peers in Kansas to support the growth of the entire Kansas City Region," said Governor Mike Parson. "In 2019, we came together to end the Kansas City Border War and to support the relocation of two key USDA agencies to Kansas City. In 2021, we collaborated on the National Security Crossroads initiative. While there are plenty of things we do agree on, we understand that there are plenty that we don't too. As the 2024 election cycle heats up, we want to show the people of Missouri and Kansas that even when we disagree, we can disagree better."
