for the Kansas legislature to step up and expand Medicaid."

According to the Alliance for a Healthy Kansas, there are more than 15,700 Kansans in Johnson, Leavenworth, Miami, and Wyandotte Counties who are currently uninsured and would qualify for coverage if the legislature would expand Medicaid. More than 5,200 new health care jobs would be created in those four counties, and nearly \$135.3 million would be generated in new annual health care spending in the region.

"As a pastor, I cannot sit by qui-

etly while people in my church, my neighborhood, and my state go without the health care they need," Pastor Kyle Reynolds, St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Lenexa, said. "The scriptures repeatedly call us to care for the most vulnerable in our midst, but Kansas is currently falling short of that benchmark. We are also called to be good stewards of our resources, and thus far too many billions of Kansas taxpayer dollars have been left in Washington while people in Kansas languish because of our state's inability to provide adequate access to Medicaid.
